

MARKS FALL IN MISSOULA MEET

Payne Sets Conference Record in Low Hurdles

Anderson of Huskies Creates New Mark in Highs

Graham Qualifies to Run in Short Barriers

MISSOULA (Mont.) June 1. (AP)—With two conference records smashed today in the trial heats, prospects are that the array of athletes who will compete in the Pacific Coast Conference track meet finals here tomorrow afternoon will flash an unparalleled assault on standing marks in the western sports world.

University of Washington remains a favorite to win the meet, with prophets claiming as high as forty points or more for the Huskies.

Southern California's Trojans are accorded a better chance for second place than Washington State College and Oregon State College, who are expected to finish high.

Russell Sweet of the San Francisco Olympic Club will run again tomorrow against Clarence Coyle of the State University in a special 100-yard dash. Coyle's time will count as an Olympic trial in this race. Today Coyle won by six inches from Sweet in a handicap race. Sweet ran 150 yards in 14.8s. after giving his opponent a four-yard start.

Steve Anderson of the University

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of Washington brought the crowd a thrill when he cleared the 120-yard high hurdles in 14.7s. to better the record of 14.9s., established by Dye of Stanford in 1926.

In the closing race of the day, James Payne of Southern California topped the 220-yard low hurdles in 23.9s. to crack the mark of 24s. flat, made a year ago by his team mate, Alex Graham.

A crowd of 3000 persons saw the trial races, six in all, including the special event.

Southern California qualified three men for the finals tomorrow in the low hurdles, University of Washington two, University of Oregon two and Washington State one. University of Washington qualified three men for the high hurdles finals, Southern California two, Montana two and Washington State one. Donald Stevlingson of Great Falls and Foy Priest, both Grizzlies, will run in the low hurdles finals.

University of Washington qualified two men, Oregon State two, Oregon one and Washington State one in the quarter-mile preliminaries.

Coach Cromwell of the University of Southern California has scratched the names of his two sprinting aces, Charley Borah and Weldon Draper, both of whom are suffering from leg injuries. Borah is also being bothered with a slight attack of the flu. Southern California's chances to win the meet were considered to rest on these two men.

ANDERSON SETS HURDLE MARKS

*Ties World Record of 14.4s.
in High Sticks*

*Turns Around and Runs Low
Barriers in 23.6s.*

*Barnes and Williams Tie in

MISSOULA (Mont.) June 7. (AP) A growling husky back from the Puget Sound fought its way to the Pacific Coast

Conference track and field title here this afternoon on Dornblaser Field in a sensational contest. University of Washington won the meet with a score of 42 1-4 points.

Steve Anderson, superb Husky hurdler, who destroyed the conference records in both hurdle races, was Washington's star.

First he cleared the 120-yard high hurdles in 14.4s., equaling the world's record set by Thompson of Dartmouth. Then he broke the conference mark in the 220-yard low hurdles, which he ran in 23.6s., bettering the mark James Payne of Southern California set Friday in the trials by three-tenths of a second.

Final scores of the meet were: University of Washington, 42 1-4; Oregon State, 33 1-2; Washington State, 30 3-4; University of Southern California, 24; Montana, 16; University of Oregon, 13 1-2; University of Idaho, 6. University of California with only two men entered, failed to score.

Officials of the meet announced that it was unlikely that the National Amateur Union would recognize the high hurdle mark set by Anderson because he knocked down the fifth hurdle. Three watches caught Anderson in 14.4s.

Wesley Foster, negro sprinter of Washington State College, easily won the century by one yard in 9.8s.

Rufus Kiser, mile favorite of Washington, set the pace in the four-lap race and remained ahead until half way around the last lap. Then Taylor challenged him and momentarily forged ahead. Hanson of Oregon State, possessing remarkable reserve power, burst past the leaders in a thrilling finish to win by two yards and finish fresh. The time was 4m. 23.1s.

SISSON VICTOR

Sisson of Oregon State jumped off to a lead in the 440-yard dash with Staunton of Gonzaga and Graham Smith challenging him. On the last turn Sisson stretched out to grab off a two-yard lead and Staunton was unable to reduce it. The time was 49.1s.

Steven Anderson won by a brace of yards in the high hurdles when he equalled the world's record. Three Trojans pushed him hard until near the end, Webber and Reynolds running neck and neck as Anderson broke the tape in 14.4s.

Foster ran away with the 220-yard dash in 21.6s. He was five yards ahead at the finish.

In the low hurdles Steve Anderson and Payne, the Trojan who broke the record Friday, were abreast until the next to the last stick, there Payne lost his stride and was thrown out of the fight for first.

Only Lee Barnes and Williams

Steve Anderson won by a brace were able to clear the bar at 13ft. 6in. in the pole vault, and both were unable to beat that mark in three

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tries. Barnes, who was out to set a new world record, was over the 14ft. 4 1-2in. mark once, but his shin brushed the bar off as he was coming down.

Blonde Herman Brix of Washington was by far the best of the lads who put the shot, tossing it 49ft. 1-4in. to take first.

Russell Sweet of the San Francisco Olympic Club darted to the end one yard ahead of Clarence Coyle, Grizzly Olympic entry, in an exhibition race. Sweet's time was 10s. flat, while Coyle was clocked in 10.1s.

James Demers, burly Eugene (Or.) high-school youth, entered in the Olympic trials, tossed the javelin 188ft. Lynn Snow of Inter-mountain Union College at Helena, another Olympic tryout participant, made 5ft. 9 1-2in. in the high jump. Trumbull of the same school, failed to place in the mile run.
