

CROMWELL HAS SQUAD ON EDGE

Coch Will Name Athletes for Trip to Boston

Barnes, Williams, Borah, Draper Sure to Go

Chances to Regain Title Are None Too Good

Trojan track-and-field athletes will leave here Friday, bound for Boston, and determined to regain, if the

thing is humanly possible, the I.C.A.A. championship, lost last year to Stanford, after two years of possession. Coach Dean Cromwell hasn't announced who will make the trip, but it isn't terribly difficult to figure out.

Cromwell is certain to take his two star pole vaulters,

Capt. Lee Barnes and Jack Williams. Barnes has lost to Sabin Carr, Yale's lithe vaulter, in the last two championship events, but this time, with a world's record of 14ft. 1 3/4-in. to his credit, he is confident he can soar to victory if it takes another record to do it. Williams is consistent at 13ft. 3in. and has cleared 13ft. 6in. on various occasions. Cromwell figures, giving the Trojans all the breaks, his vaulters will take first, and a tie for fourth place, for six and one-half points in the serial event. Cromwell rates them, Barnes, Carr, Edmonds and somebody to tie with Williams, in the order named.

Charley Borah and Weldon Draper will make the trip, with the latter performing only in the 100. Borah won both sprints last year, and at present is resting in an effort to get his strained muscle in condition for the eastern invasion. If he is in shape, Borah should win both events again. Cromwell thinks Draper will pick up two points in the century, for a total of twelve in the sprints.

Jimmy Payne is picked to win the low hurdles with Alex Graham coming along in third position for three more points. Payne will run only in the low sticks, Cromwell says, in order to make sure of a victory in that event. He is taking no chances on having Payne tumble in the highs, and perhaps incur a serious injury.

For the high hurdles Cromwell will take Cliff Reynolds and Charley Webber. Reynolds played two years ago, and Webber took fifth last year. Cromwell is hoping they will pick up three points between them. The other certainty to go east is Jess Hill, broad jumper, whom Cromwell is picking for fourth place, although Hill may get one of his wild jumps, and place better than that.

Stanford is favored to win again. The Cards will score heavily in the two shot events; Nichols and West will round up almost as many in the hurdles; Edmonds will place in the pole vault; King should win the high jump; Zombro and Dyer will score in the broad jump; and the Cards probably will pick up points in the javelin, and Spencer, if he gets anything close to a clear track, has a great chance to win the quarter. With that array of talent, Coach "Dink" Templeton's athletes should win handily.
