

UNKNOWNNS SHOW UP WELL AS TROJANS TRAIN FOR RELAYS; WILLIAMS WINS POLE VAULT

Coach Dean Cromwell sent a flock of untested and untried Trojan track athletes through a series of events in the Coliseum yesterday afternoon, and came up with some creditable performances.

Jerry Pearson, an unknown, romped home a winner in the 440 in 51 1-5s. Jack Williams pole vaulted 13 ft. without difficulty. Bob Swede galloped home in a snappy 4:37 mile. Jim Stewart tossed the dis-

cus 138ft. 9in. Jack MacFayden raced the 220 in 22.8s, and Charley Weber flew over the high sticks in 15 1-5. All of which caused some hilarity and a few cheers.

PEARSON SPARKLES

Pearson's feat was the high light of the afternoon. He was a fair quarter miler with the frosh last year, after doing nothing of particular merit at a high school in Wilmington. Yesterday's effort was his first full quarter in competition, and he showed enough speed to make those present believe he could have shaded 51s. if he had been pressed. Lee Bastajian ran a bang-up race to place second, with "Red" Maxwell of last year's varsity, third. This trio, along with Vic Williams, who did not run yes-

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day, will make up the four-man team in the A.A.U. relays Saturday.

Williams, after two indifferent seasons, evidently has gotten down to work in earnest. He cleared 13 ft. by 6 in. yesterday, despite the fact that he seemed to lack spring.

Nine athletes started out in the mile, and, after three slow quarters Bob Swede and Ed Hammatt set out to make the last quarter a battle, and they did, with Swede finishing on top by a matter of three-fifths of a second. Swede will run far under that figure by the time the season gets well under way.

Stewart got up from a sick bed to compete in three events and placed in all of them. He had two throws of better than 134ft. in the discus and finished third in both the high jump and shot put.

With both Charley Borah and Dick Wehner out of the 100, Milton Maurer, victor in the recent Interfraternity affair, zipped home in 10 3-5s. Wehner went into the furlong, but was evidently far from condition, for he was far back when McFayden raced home to win handily in 22.8. McFayden is a made-over quarter-miler, and showed enough promise to insure him plenty of active work in the furlong in the future.

Weber got away to a beautiful start in the highs and nosed out Stokes, the frosh star, in 15 1-5. Weber was well-nigh perfect in form, and seems to be in for a good season.

Bryce Schurr gave Ed Gloege a handy trimming in the half, winning in 2:02.8 with Jess Cook, an indifferent performer last year, a surprise third. He was clocked in 2:05 2-5.

However, the usual Trojan jinx cropped up when Jimmy Payne announced that the doctor had ordered him not to do any track work for at least a month. Payne has undergone a series of illnesses and operations since last season, and is not yet in the best of health. He is definitely out of the A.A.U. relays and may not run against the Olympic Club.
