

TROJANS NEED BORAH

Star Sprinter's Presence May Mean Difference Between Victory and Defeat in Club Meet Saturday

If the Trojans hope to keep the Olympic Club from repeating its track victory of last year, when the two teams meet in the Coliseum Saturday, Capt. Charley Borah will have to be not only ready to run, but to run as fast as he ever did.

For the points that Borah can pick up with two first places in the sprints probably will mean the

difference between victory and defeat. Stanford conquered the Clubites by something like 38 points, and the narrow margin, if any, by which the Trojans win, will indicate their chances against the Cards.

Sweet of the Clubites nosed out both Dyer and Lauritzen

in the 100 at Palo Alto, and finished second to the former in a :21.8 furlong. Grey, his team-mate, was close up on both occasions, although he did not score points.

If Borah isn't at tops, then Dick Wehner, Vic Williams and Milt Maurer will carry the burden, and probably will pick up a couple of third places, no more.

STORIE FAVORED

Bill Storie, the ex-Card, was six yards behind Johnny Morrison when the latter ambled 48.8s. in the quarter last week. The best time Gerald Pearson, Troy's best, has made is 50 3-5s. A second and a third seems all the Trojans can pick up here.

Holman turned in a 1m. 58.2s half against the Cards, the former high-school boy winning by a matter of three or four yards. Ed Cloege was clocked slightly under 2 minutes flat in the recent interclass meet, when Bill McGeagh ran 1m. 59 1-5s. Bryce Schurr was close enough to insure the Trojans of a second and third against Holman.

The Trojans seem certain to break into the scoring column for 8 points in the mile, with Bob Swede and Vic Fitzmaurice doing the galloping. Brack and Shine were behind McKinnon in 4m. 33 4-5s. at Palo Alto, while Swede and Fitzmaurice were close up to Hammatt in 4m. 30.6s. in the class fracas.

Warren Woodruff can make Coach Dean Cromwell feel a lot better by winning the two mile, but his time of 10m. 15 3-5s. in a hard-fought two-mile doesn't compare too favorably with Keegan's second to Brown in 10m. 6s. at Palo Alto. So give Woodruff and Patterson second and third to the Club athlete.

NOT SO GOOD

The Club hurdlers don't amount to a great deal, and Charley Webber, Ernie Payne and Dunc Powers ought to pick up 12 points in the two stick events. Jimmy Payne may run, but if he does, he will have but one week of practice behind him, and won't be in any condition.

The Club jumpers—Bob King, Filmer and Levy—finished in that order against the Cards, and ought to best Al Bowen of the Trojans, whose best effort this season has been 5ft. 9in. However, Jack Williams, Bill Hubbard and Harold Mitchell or Bill Livingston can get back those 9 points in the pole vault.

Mortensen will be lucky to take a second against the Club javelin throwers, and Schleiher may take second to Corson in the shot. He'll be lucky to get third in the discus.

Kimball Dyer and Jess Hill will hook up again in the broad jump. Hill held the Coast record until Dyer, then at Stanford, broke his mark of better than 24ft. 8in. Dyer's record this season is at least a foot better than Hill's. Howard Paul, the other Trojan, has been ill for the past two weeks, and may not jump.

The Trojans should, and probably will, win the relay with Gerald Person, Vic Williams, Lee Bastajian and Red Maxwell handling the baton.

Without Borah, the Olympic Club would win 71-60, off the above pronostications. With Borah taking two first places, the Trojans would ease in with a 66-65 victory. Which is probably entirely wrong, but nonetheless makes the meet look unexpectedly interesting.
