

# BRIX SHATTERS SHOT-PUT MARK

*U.S.C. Wins Team Honors at  
Raisin Day Meet*

*Stanford Athletes Finish Up  
in Second Place*

*Corson Upsets Eric Krenz in  
Discus Event*

FRESNO, April 27.—Charles

Borah and Frank Wykoff, Southern California's two brilliant sprinters, shared honors here today with Herman Brix of Los Angeles Athletic Club in the third annual West Coast relays.

The curly-headed U.S.C. flyer, and the fair-haired Glendale galloper, each equalled the world's record of 9.3-sec. for the 100-yard dash.

Not satisfied with tying the mark in their respective heats, the great Los Angeles dash artists went out and did it all over again in the finals. Wykoff was running in Class B and Borah in Class A, so they did not face each other.

## BRAND NEW MARK

Brix gave the 8000 rabid fans a big thrill when he shoved the shot 5ft. 11.5-in. to set up a new American record and come within an inch or so of John Kirk's world mark which stands at 5ft. 11-16in.

The meet itself resulted in a brilliant triumph for Dean Cronwell's University of Southern California varsity. Copping first in two of the four relay events and finishing second in those not won, the Trojans picked up a flock of points and finished with the splendid team total of 57½.

## FIELD MEN FLOP

Stanford, despite the failure of her field men to perform up to their usual standard, was a good second with 45½ points.

The Los Angeles Athletic Club made an exceptionally strong showing to finish third with 30 points, nosing out the Olympic Club of San Francisco by two digits. Poor old California tallied 9 points and the U.S.C. frosh got 4.

In Class B, Glendale Junior College gave Fresno State plenty of competition, but the home-town boys had a wee bit too much class and won this division with 34 points to 30 for their rivals. Other schools in this section wound up with the following points: San Diego State College, 20; Pacific and Modesto, 14 each; San Jose, 12; Compton, 11; Nevada and St. Ignatius, 8 each; Santa Ana and Whittier, 3 each, and Fullerton, 1.

## THE CASUALTIES

In a nutshell here's what the boys did to records which were worth about 10 cents on the dollar here today:

(1.) Tied the 100-yard dash record four times.

(2.) Set one new American record in the shot put.

(3.) Created thirteen new

West Coast relay marks and tied

two others.

Six of these records were broken in Class A competition featuring the big boys and the marks equalled also came in this division. Some idea of the class of competition can be gained from learning that Walker of the L.A.A.C., a former Hamet High School boy, if memory serves correctly, leaped an even 24ft. on his first try in the broad jump and then failed to place in the finals.

## TOUGH COMPETITION

Chuck Harlow, national javelin champion, couldn't place in the wand-wafting event and neither could Kibby or Spurling, Stanford's two aces. Frank Lombardi, who is nationally known as a sprinter, was shut out in his first trial heat in the 100-yard dash, placing fourth. Johnny Hill of U.C.L.A. finished

third in his trial heat but was nowhere to be found in the finals.

In addition to these startling developments there were two genuine surprises in the field events; one was the feat of Jess Mortenson, Southern California, holding all-around athletic star, who placed second in the javelin to Jimmy Demare with an astonishing throw of 193 ft. Mortenson had never bettered 150 ft. in his life before today and his feat was a distinct surprise.

### BREVE SUCCESS

The other upset races in the class, where Eric Krebs, Stanford's new captain and the man who did 193 ft. this spring, was defeated by Jim Gordon of the Olympic Club. Gordon did 181 ft. 10 in. and Krebs had to be content with 148 ft. for second place. Looks as if that Husser made a mistake in staying at home.

Wykoff got in his best ticks early this morning when he actually led through the first heat of the century and was clocked in 9 3-5. Four others agreed on 9 2-5, and two others there were out in 10 and 9 2-5.

Dick Templeton of Stanford, using the watch which was employed by the head timer in last year's Olympic Games at Amsterdam, caught Wykoff in 8 ft. 10 in. being a one-hundredth of a second watch.

### TIT FOR TAT

Borah's lead in the other class came soon after and Charley did exactly as Wykoff had done. Here again four watches had 9 1-5, and the other two showed 9 2-5.

Templeton's clock caught Borah in 8 ft. 10 in. which is just the slightest shade over 9 1-5.

Charley appeared to be trying a bit harder than Wykoff had in his heat, for when Frank suddenly looked around twice Borah kept his head to the front.

In the finals this afternoon Wykoff was a full yard in front of Jackson, Fresno State star, who did 84-8 to win his heat in the morning. Caper of Santa Ana Junior College was a good third with George of Whittier fourth. Here again four watches had 9 2-5 with the other being closer to 9 3-5.

Hector Dyer of Stanford showed a lot of class in the finals of class A when he gave Borah a real race of it. Charley won by a little over one foot and he looked every inch the runner that he is. Best of the Olympic Club was third and Maurer of the Trojans fourth.

### CALM AND PEACEFUL

There was no wind of any consequence in either the heats or finals of each race.

Borah was the hero of a thrilling relay race in the 500-yard event when he took the baton fully three yards behind Hector Dyer for the final 100 and then roared out the standard leg by two feet at the tape. The time of 1m. 27 2-5, set a new meet record.

Maurer and Weiner ran the first two stretches and left the Trojans overworked in the rear, but Peterson almost evened it up, and then Borah did his stuff.

Dyer was a beautiful race himself and promises to develop into one of the country's best sprinters. He is only a sophomore, but has made tremendous strides in his running. Borah ran five races in all.

### NICK IN SHAPE

Nick Carter, who races Ray Capper at the Coliseum next Saturday, turned in a brilliant half-mile race to give the Los Angeles Athletic Club team a well-earned victory in the two-mile relay.

Now took the baton eight yards behind Finnamore of the Trojans on the last lap and then went and gave the S.C. boy a trimming. The time resulted in a new meet record of 1m. 57 in., the old meet being 1m. 58. Clem, Barton and Harbach were the other members of the L.A.C. team.

Jeddy Welch, regarded as one of our best Los Angeles hurdlers, met his master in Kaster of Fresno State in the Class B high sticks when the local boy did 14 1-5. Jeddy tried so hard to stay with Kaster that he knotted down four of the last five hurdles and consequently didn't place.

### ANOTHER RECORD

Stanford's mile relay team of Stone, Iyer, McKinnan and Morrison set a new meet record and made the fastest time registered on the Coast this year by doing 1m. 18 1-5. The Trojans did not use either Vic Williams, who has a bad leg, or Morsch in this event, but managed to finish second anyway.

Jack Williams had his work by try at a new record in the pole vault, but missed on each of three trials after clearing the event at 120 1 2-5. Edmunds and Hubbard cleared 120 to tie for second, but could go no higher.

Bob King was announced as the possessor of a new meet record in the high jump at 6 ft. 4 1-5, but it later developed that he had tied with his Olympic Club team-mate, Osgood and Pitzer, at 6 ft. 3 1-5, which would have made all three feel kind of small trimmings as the Fresno High School boy by the name of Mabry did 6 ft. 4 1-5, yesterday. King actually cleared 6 ft. 4 1-5, however, after the event had been finished.

### WHAT A SOUR

Husker was leading in the shot put with a throw of 101 7 3-5, until Eric sponsored that tremendous heave of his.

Johnny Brown of San Diego State and Peterson of the same institution, set new meet records in Class B in the discus and javelin, respectively, the former doing 141 ft. 10 in. and the latter 150.

The broad jump was a classic. Marvin, the Olympic Club veteran, won with a leap of 24 ft. 7 in., while Barber of the S. C. track was second with 24 ft. 2 in. Third went to Kim Eyer, 24 ft. 1 1-5, and Paul of the Trojans coming down into his own at last with 24 ft. 1 in. to take fourth and was out walked. Howell of Stanford, one of the heroes of the S. C. meet, did not place.

The weather was blistering hot

but the meet was run off in snappy fashion and sparkling performances were the fare here in good humor. The affair has given into one of much importance and the organizers of the idea deserve plenty of credit.
