

BREAKS RECORD SET BY KRENZ

*Pennsylvania Surprises to
Take Second Spot*

*Borah Fails to Finish as Leg
Again Injured*

*Stanford Field Performers
Show Great Form*

FRANKLIN FIELD, PHILADEL-
PHIA, May 31. (AP)—**Stanford Uni-

versity's brawny band of athletes, coached by "Dink" Templeton, dominated the qualifying trials of the intercollegiate A. A. A. track-and-field championships today.

By capturing fourteen places in the preliminaries, four more than Pennsylvania, eastern "dark horse," the Cardinals

from Palo Alto demonstrated that there was no ballyhoo about the advance notices of their prowess. As a result they are overwhelming favorites to romp off with their third successive team championship in the finals tomorrow and thereby give the Far West its eighth triumph over the eastern talent in a period of nine years.

So sensationally did Stanford's stars perform in the field events, their specialties, that it seemed they are almost assured of sufficient points to clinch the title without lifting an implement tomorrow, since this afternoon's achievements all stand.

• ROTHERT STARS

Harlow Rothert, Cardinal all-around star, turned in the day's only record performance, when he hurled the sixteen-pound shot 50ft. 3in., eclipsing by two inches the mark of his team-mate, Eric Krenz, who did no better than fourth in today's tests in defense of his title. Krenz, however, set the pace in the discus while another Cardinal, Leo Kibby, topped the field in the javelin with a fine heave of 204ft. 7in.

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men in eight of the eleven events in which trials were held. The Cardinals placed three each in the discus and high hurdles, two each in the shot put and javelin, one each in the broad jump, 100-yard dash, 200-yard dash and 440 run.

Although the trials revealed no team with sufficient strength to menace Stanford's dominating position, Pennsylvania pulled a big surprise by qualifying ten athletes. Lawson Robertson's Quakers clinched second position when a late ruling by officials added Harold Lamborg to the discus qualifiers. One of Lamborg's throws hit a rival teacher and was close enough to the qualifying limit to give him a chance in the finals tomorrow.

In the battle for intercollegiate honors, Stanford will have considerable aid from Southern California, which qualified nine men in spite of the elimination of Charley Borah, runner champion, in the 200-yard dash, and Vic Williams in the quarter-mile.

New York University, eastern indoor champions, made a good showing with eight qualifiers, tying with Yale, but Violet hopes for tomorrow rest chiefly upon two half-mile men, Phil Edwards, the champion, and Fred Yet, who equaled his team-mate today by running his best in lap, 50 8-10s.

The defeat of Borah, who failed to recover his form after an injury several weeks ago on the Coast, left the Pacific Coast's hopes for sprint honors up to "Mac" Iyer, Stanford sophomore, who qualified handsily in both dashes. Iyer was beaten by John Harwood of Syracuse by an eyelash in his heat of the 100, in which Jimmy Dalry of Holy Cross, set the pace for the field with a 2 8-10s performance, but the rangy Stanford youth came back in the 100 to win his trial and share the best time of the day, 21 8-10s, with Karl Wintermath of Georgetown. Borah was fourth in the first heat, won by Kent of Colgate in 21 8-10s.

KEENE BALLIES

Robert finished the day's record-breaking starts early when he later shattered the meet record in the shot put. On his second toss, the Stanford star added 7-8 of an inch to the record of 50 ft. 11 in. set by Keene in winning last year. On his next throw, Robert registered 50 ft. 10 in. Keene, off form at first, needed his last throw of 49 ft. 10 in. to qualify. Barry Beninger, Pennsylvania all-arounder, was surprised by gaining second position with a throw of 48 ft. 2 8-10s, more than a foot beyond his best previous performance.

While the invading talent from the Far West focused its main attention on the field events, the track trials saw the easterners doing their best to make themselves for the prospective loss of team honors once more. Among the star exhibitions were those of John Collier of Brown, who led the 120-yard high hurdle qualifiers in 24 8-10s, and "Pete" Bowen, feet Pittsburgher, who reeled off the fastest quarter-mile, 48 4-10s, after qualifying in the 100 in 2 8-10s.

The Stanford captain, Ross Nichols, who holds the high hurdle championship, was beaten in his heat by McCoy of Pennsylvania, but the time was slow, 15 8-10s, indicating that Nichols was taking it somewhat easy in preparation for a stiffer battle tomorrow.

PHIA, June 1. (AP)—Four record-

smashing performances, including a sensational half-mile in 1:52 1-5 by Phil Edwards of New York University, brought the fifty-third inter-collegiate A.A.A. A. track and field championships to a climax today as Stanford University won the team title for the third year in a row.

The Cardinals

from Palo Alto, coached by "Dink" Templeton, not only gave the Far West its eighth triumph over a span of nine years, but did it by the most overwhelming margin in thirty years. Not since 1899 when Pennsylvania's great team won with a record total of 37 points, beating its nearest rival by twenty-nine points, has any team captured the historic meet by so one-sided a margin as Stanford.

Stanford scored exactly 45 3-8 points, tallying in nine of the fifteen events. This more than doubled the count of the nearest Cardinal rival, Southern California, which tallied 21 points and thereby added to the rout of the East. Pennsylvania finished third with 18 7-8 points, New York University fourth with 14, and Yale fifth with 13 5-8. California, the third contender from the Pacific Coast, finished in a tie with Pittsburgh for sixth place with 11 points.

MANY THRILLS

Except that its proportions exceeded even the rosiest expectations, there was nothing startling or unexpected in the team victory for Stanford. But there were plenty of record-breaking thrills in one of the greatest competitive carnivals in the half-century history of the East's blue-ribbon meet.

To Phil Edwards, the dusky N. Y. U. flyer and Canadian Olympic star, went the main honors as he spread-eagled his field in the half-mile run. In defending his title successfully, Edwards not only shattered the fourteen-year-old meet record of the famous Ted Meredith, set at 1m 53s., but also equaled Meredith's American outdoor record of 1m. 52 1-5s., made in 1916, he was only three-fifths of a second behind the world's record of 1m. 51 3-5s., made by Dr Otto Peltzer of Germany at London in 1926.

Edwards was primed for the greatest race of his career and

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did it, as a crowd of 15,000 spectators cheered him on, running the first 440 yards in less than 50s. Edwards was thirty yards in front of his team-mate, Fred Velt, going into the last lap. It appeared the slim, but beautifully striking negro had set off at too fast a pace, he seemed to slow down, rounding the last turn, but had enough left to finish fast, breaking the tape twenty-five yards in front of his nearest rival, Chapman of Bates, with Velt third.

The Far West took its share of the record-busting honors when Jesse Hill of Southern California, broad jumped to a new meet mark of 261. 7-in., while Harlow Rotheri of Stanford clinched the shotput title with a toss of 59ft. 3in which he made in the trials yesterday and which was good enough to beat his team-mate, Eric Krens, the 1928 champion. Krens made a gallant effort to overcome his rival, but his toss of 59ft. 8-in., was good only for second place.

Another long-standing record was topped when Jimmy Reid, Harvard captain, came from behind to beat Bill Cox of Penn State and win the two-mile title for the second straight year in 9m. 22s. This barely displaced the record of 9m. 22 2-5s., made by Ivan Dresser of Cornell in 1919.

A fifth record was bettered when Sid Kischhorst of Yale, retaining his title, won the 220-yard low hurdles in 22 2-10s. 3-10s. better than the mark set in 1928 by A. C. Kraenzlein of Pennsylvania. Because of the stiff wind at his back, however, Kischhorst's mark was ruled out.

THREE TIED

Several other records were threatened. Eric Krens, retaining one of the two crowns he wore last year, came close to his own mark in the discus when he hurled the winning throw of 153ft. 4in. Three pole vaulters attacked the world's record of 14ft. made by Sabiu Carr of Yale two years ago, but all failed and finished in a first-place tie at 13ft. 9in. The trio consisted of Ward Edmonds of Stanford, Jack Williams of Southern California and Fred Sturdy of Yale. Leo Kirby of Stanford was just short of the javelin record when he won with 264ft. 7in.

Stanford captured three first places and tied for a fourth through the individual efforts of Rotheri, Krens, Edmonds and Kirby. This quartet alone collected twenty-five points, enough to win the meet, altogether nine of Stanford's starting squad of fourteen athletes figured in the scoring.

"Mac" Dyer, the rangy Stanford sophomore sprinter, was twice only a few steps short of the fame that goes to sprint champions. He contributed eight of the Cardinal points by finishing second to Karl Wildermuth in the 100-yard dash and runner-up to Ricyrd Kent, the new 220-yard champion.

Southern California, the hard-luck team of the meet, saw mis-haps wreck its chances of ringing up a bigger point total. The elimination yesterday of two injured Trojans, Charley Borah, in the 220, and Vic Williams in the 440, was followed by the breakdown of Jimmy Payne this afternoon in the low-hurdle semi-finals. In the final of the 220 hurdles, however, Ernest Payne, no relation to Jimmy — came through to extend the champion, Kischhorst, and finish a close second.

Pennsylvania, aided by the fine work of Barney Berlinger in the shotput and high jump, led the eastern teams, but New York University furnished two of the most sensational winners in Edwards and Joe Hickey, red-headed mile champion, who uncocked a terrific spurt to cut down the favorite, George Offenbauer of Penn State, in the stretch. N. Y. U.'s total of 14 points was twice as many as the Violets ever previously scored in the I.C.A.A. outdoor championships, although the New Yorkers won the indoor title meet last winter.

Pittsburgh's spectacular speed merchant, "Pete" Bowen, failed in his attempt to register a double victory, but came off with the 440-yard championship when he withstood the challenge of Charley Engle of Yale to win in 48 4-10s., this capped so much of Bowen's stamina, however that in the final of the 100 he was sixth and last.
