

FRANK WYKOFF STAR OF MEET

*Trojan Runner Does Century
in 9 4-5 Seconds*

*Beats Alf and Also Wins
Furlong in 22 Flat*

*Bob Hall, Grid Star, Hurls
Discus 141ft.*

Running as smoothly and as easily as he has at any time in his brilliant career, Frank Wykoff, kingpin of Coach Dean Cromwell's array of sprinting talent at the University of Southern California, yesterday electrified a small band of spectators when he raced the century in 9 4-5s. and the furlong in 22s. flat in an informal meet on Bovard field.

Wykoff beat Ray Alf, the L.A.A.C. junior 220 champion, by about a yard in each event, with Murray Schultz, the old Caltech star, running for the club again, third. The Trojan sprinter just loafed along in each race, staying slightly ahead of Alf and talking to him all the way. Schultz came up like a bullet in the furlong, passing two men in the last twenty yards to finish third. A small-sized towel would have covered the three of them at the tape.

COACHES SMILE

Coaches Dean Cromwell and Tommy Davis were all smiles after they had peeked at their watches at the finish of the 100. "It's the best I've seen Frank run since the Olympic tryouts in Boston two years ago," Davis declared, while Cromwell was busy predicting a great year for the Glendale flash.

There were a number of other noteworthy performances on the day's card, which saw Trojan varsity and freshman, Mercury stars and several unattached

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athletes, most of them attending Southern California but ineligible for the present, at least, going through their paces.

Jeddy Welsh, national junior high hurdle king, and Bill Carls, who holds the same crown in the low sticks, were in excellent early-season shape. Welsh won both events, taking the highs in 15 1-5, and scoring in the 140-yard lows in 15 flat, with Carls a yard behind.

Bob Hall, the husky sophomore tackle, heaved the discus 141ft. 6in. on his last throw, to noseout both Edwards and Brix of the L.A.A.C., and thereby indicating that by the time the Stanford meet rolls around he may be ready to give Eric Krenz and company a real battle. Sam Kline got off a nice toss of 45ft. 7 1/2 in. in the shot, and appears ready to enjoy his best season.

BARBER WINS

Dick Barber, national junior broad jump king, leaped 22ft. 6in. on a very bad runway. Jim Stewart, who confidently expects to be declared eligible any minute now, competed in both weight events, but without much success. He cleared 6ft. in the high jump, however.

J. Wakefield Burke, now eligible for varsity competition, turned in a flash 440, winning in 51.6. If he manages to stay in his present form, he'll make a fine running mate for Vic Williams.

Three "unattached" athletes, all of whom will be eligible for varsity next year, turned in fine performances. Sam Said, a transfer from the University of Kansas, won the second heat of the century in 10 1-5, with Charley Parsons, son of the old Trojan sprinter, and nephew of the more recent Johnny of S.C. fame, second, close behind.

McNaughton, a transfer from the University of British Columbia, tied Keefer of the club at 6ft. 13-4in. in the high jump. Melvin Shine, a freshman, placed second to Prowell of California Christian College in a 4:42 3-5-mile. Shine competed for the Olympic Club last year, and thus lost his freshman eligibility. Summary:
