Wakefield Burke. was who ran the best lap, pulling away from Dick Pomeroy of the L.A.A.C. A heroic last lap by Oliver Worden put the Mercuries right behind Burke at the finish and helped to make the time as fast as it was.

Such speed in the mile relay indicates that the Trojans, for the first time in many years, will have a fair chance of winning this event from Stanford. The Cards hold the Coast record of 3m. 17 3-5s., established back in 1926, but the present team is hardly capable of much better than 3m. 19s

Yesterday's race was the second fastest ever turned in by a Trojan relay team. In 1927 a squad set (Continued on Page 2, Column 8)

What had been billed as an open 100-yard race developed into a Troian workout when Frank Wykoff. Weldon Draper and Milton Maurer were three of the four sprinters taking part. Wykoff won in 9 4-5s. against the wind, but not until Draper, giving him a terrific battle, had strained a muscle and slowed down at the eighty-yard mark. Draper was in front at fifty yards, due to his good start, but Wykoff had drawn slightly ahead when Draper suffered the leg injury which proved painful, but not serious. Draper has had tough luck in this manner several times in the past. His misfortune yesterday indicates that he may not be actually right for the Stanford meet.

Accidents marred two relay races. In the opener, which featured the L.A.A.C.'s twomile quartet against the Trojans, the Mercuries got off to a lead when Bill Clum did the first half in 2m. 18. Harold Lovejoy took up the burden and was leading his Trojan rival when on the second lap pulled a muscle in the calf of his right leg and collapsed on the track. The Trojans went on to win as they pleased, with Fitzmaurice looking very good. McGeagh, Troy's star 880 man, running the final lap, was not extended.
