

WORLD'S SPRINT RECORD SHATTERED BY TROJAN

Flying Feet of Glendale Youth Are Timed by Four Watches; Hables Finishes Two Yards Behind

Running the greatest race of his brilliant career, Frank Wykoff of the University of Southern California yesterday equaled the fastest time ever made by a human being in the 100-yard dash.

The fair-haired Glendale youth covered the distance in 9 2-5s. to defeat Les Hables of Stanford University by a shade under two yards. Wykoff's victory was a decisive one and in a large measure avenges his defeat at the hands of Hec Dyer last month for Hables has trimmed Dyer twice lately.

Hulvey Hurls Hollywood to First Win of Week

Bill Rumler Hits Home Run With Bases Loaded

Gazella Also Gets Circuit Wallop for Sheiks

Hollywood's Stars regained their batting eyes at the expense of a trio of San Francisco's youthful hurlers and, behind the effective hurling of methodical Hank Hulvey, banged out a 13-to-3 triumph over the Seals yesterday at Wrigley Field to break a four-game losing streak.

In winning the Sheiks looked something like the Hollywood team of last year. However, it was a couple of home runs by Bill Rumley and Mike Gazella that produced the scores which made the Stars look good. Rumler's circuit clout came with the bases bulging, while Gazella's homer was made while two Stars were aboard the bases.

The Sheiks made only ten hits off the combined hurling efforts of Curtis Davis, Clyde Perry and Hal Turpin, but the bingles were propitiously placed in back of walks and Seal errors to make it possible for them to do the most good.

Hulvey limited the slugging Seals to seven hits, which is something of a record inasmuch as they had

Frank ran a perfect race yesterday, the occasion being the annual A.A.U. meet at Patterson Field. He was off his marks with the crack of the gun, the entire field of sprinters getting away together. But Wykoff had more drive with his opening strides, for it was immediately apparent that he was going to defeat Hables and also run a terrific race.

The Trojan star kept his stride every foot of the way and flew into the tape at top speed while the assembled fans roared their approval at his somewhat unexpected victory over Hables. But the first cheer was a mere whisper compared to the shouts which greeted Charley Keppen's announcement that the Southland's premier sprinter had negotiated the distance in 9 2-5s.

There were four watches on the race. Inspection disclosed that three were right on the 9 2-5s. mark, with the fourth slightly under that figure. There was a slight wind blowing at the time, but it was crossing the track. Referee Les Henry declared the record official and it will be applied for as a new world's mark.

George Simpson of Ohio State ran the 100 in 9 2-5s. in Chicago last June, but used starting blocks. One or two others have also equaled this time but there have always been circumstances attendant to their performances which might prevent a record being accepted.

Wykoff is the first Pacific Coast sprinter to run the 100 in 9 2-5s. The previous best record in Southern California was that of Charley Paddock, who was clocked in 9.5s. at the Coliseum in 1928.

The Trojan speedster did not take part in the 220 and Hables, running beautifully, won in 21 3-5s., beating Nate George of Whittier by more than two yards. Hables is good enough to make anybody step lively in any race from the 100

In addition to Wykoff's record in the 100 there were three other brand-new Southern Pacific A.A.U. marks.

The outstanding of these was Jim Stewart's leap of 6ft. 5in. in the high jump, displacing the old record of 6ft. 4 3/4-in. held by Henry Lassaletie, who tied with Bob Van Osdel, yesterday's favorite, at 6ft. 4in. Stewart's fine showing helps S.C.'s I.C. 4-A. chances tremendously.

Herman Brix regained his old form and shoved the shot 51ft. 4 1/2-in. to defeat Harlow Rotheri of Stanford and thereby better the old record of 50ft. 4in. set by John Kuck two years ago. It was good to see genial Herm doing his stuff properly again.

MILE RELAY MARK

The other mark came in the mile relay when the fleet Trojan team of J. W. Burke, Art Woessner, Gerald Pearson and Vic Williams negotiated the distance in 3m. 17 3/8s. The old mark was 3m. 18 3/8s.

Bob Maxwell, one of the L.A.A.C.'s grand old men, sprang a surprise when he won the high hurdles in 14 4/8s., which is pretty good time for a guy who has been in the business world for half a dozen years. Bob nosed out Jeddy Welch in a stirring finish.

The half mile was a corker with Bill McOeagh having too much finish for his team-mate, Cliff Halstead, who had enjoyed the lead until the back stretch. Webster of Webb School came up like a shot to beat Halstead out for second. The time of 1m. 58s. indicates that McOeagh may be able to do something back east if he doesn't lose all his stuff riding on the trains.

Jess Mortenson came out of retirement to throw the javelin 200ft. and defeat Jim DeMers, the L.A.A.C. star who generally does 215ft.
