

CARD CAPTAIN BETTERS MARK BY FOUR FEET

Trojans Win Intercollegiate Track Championship With Stanford in Second Place

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STANFORD STADIUM, May 17.—A mighty heave from the brawny right arm of Eric Krenz, Stanford captain, and a new world's record in the discus went into the record books here today.

→ The new mark is 167ft. 5 $\frac{3}{4}$ in.

The marvelous throw shattered Krenz's own record of 163ft. 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ in., and eventually will displace the approved world's mark which now stands to the credit of Bud Houser.

The international federation approve these new feats every two years, and Krenz's record will not come up for scrutiny until 1932.

It was in the Stanford Stadium that Houser threw the platter for a world's record four years ago.

And it was therefore, quite fitting that Krenz, in rare form, should reclaim the mark for Stanford in its own stadium.

NO FLUKE

It was by no fluke that Krenz today laid claim to an undisputed record.

Three times he bettered his own existing records. His throws in order were: 163ft. 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ in.; 164ft. 8in.; 167ft. 5 $\frac{3}{4}$ in.

The 164-foot toss was disqualified, the officials ruling that his foot was outside the circle when he started the throw.

Krenz thereupon unleashed his 163ft. 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. toss and soon followed it up with the new world's record.

Krenz's feat was the bright and shining feature of the annual California intercollegiate track-and-field championships.

TROJANS WIN

The University of Southern California lived up to the dope sheets and won the meet with a total of 78 13-15 points, but as the result of several upsets Stanford made the meet much closer than expected.

The Cardinals were second with 62 1-15 points, followed by California with 17 1-30 and U.C.L.A., 7 1-30.

Second only to Krenz's remarkable performance, was the sprint duels between Frank Wykoff of S.C. and Hec Dyer of Stanford in the 100 and 220.

And the question as to who is the best sprinter in the State is still unsettled.

Wykoff won the 100 by five feet in 9 7-10s. And Dyer had the same edge in the 220 in 21 5-10s. A breeze strong enough to hamper the
