

# CHICAGO MEET TODAY

## *Athletes Make Good Marks in Preliminaries and Are All Set for Finals This Afternoon*

CHICAGO, June 10. (Exclusive)—The performance of Herman Phillips of Butler University of Indianapolis, who tied his own meet record of 48.7-10s. for the quarter-mile run, featured the preliminaries in the sixth annual individual track-and-field championships of the National Collegiate A.A. held today on Soldiers' Field in Grant Park. Finals in all events will be held at the same place tomorrow afternoon starting at 2 o'clock.

Phillips, who has been one of the most consistent quarter-milers in the Middle West for the last two years, tied his meet record in the first heat. Although four qualified in each trial, the Butler runner did not have to extend himself seriously to win. He ran in second position until the head of the back stretch, when he went into the lead and breasted the tape with plenty of speed left to stave off any challenges.

The surprise of the trials in this event was the failure of Baird of Iowa to qualify. The Hawkeye won the event in the Big Ten champion-

ships but failed to show the speed which carried him over the line a winner in the Western Conference championships. Butler of Geneva College of Beaver Falls, Pa., took the second heat in the quarter-mile. His time was one tenth of a second slower than that of Phillips. If these two winners are not interfered with in tomorrow's finals, the meet record should be shattered.

Butler also qualified for the finals in the 100-yard dash. The Geneva College flier won his heat in 9.9s., the same as Cockrell of Texas and Alderman of Michigan State. Indications are this will be a close race and the winner may equal or break the meet record of 9.8s. made by Hubbard of Michigan in 1925. Hester of Michigan, victor in the century at the Big Ten championships, failed to qualify. He

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ran in the first heat and finished fourth.

F. J. Cuhel of Iowa showed some of his old-time form by qualifying in the high and low hurdles. He turned in the best time in the heats of both races. He won his trial in the high barriers in 15s. and took his heat in the low hurdles in 23.8s.

Ed Haynes of Denver qualified for the finals in the 100-yard dash and 440-yard run. The athlete from the Rocky Mountain Conference is a strong runner and Coach Bingham expects him to place in both races. Cockrell of Texas will be in the finals of both dashes and so will Webusus of Pittsburgh.

Della Maria of Notre Dame turned in the best time in the heats of the 220-yard dash. The Notre Dame dash man took his heat in 21.4s. Lindus Caulume of Iowa State turned in the fastest half-mile. The Ames runner won his trial in 1m. 56.6s. J. Charteris of Washington, holder of the meet record at 1m. 55.4s., won his heat in 1m. 58.2s.

Trials in two field events were held. Gwinn of Pittsburgh had the best mark in the hammer throw. He threw the 16-pound weight 155 feet, 5 3-4 inches. Corson of the College of Pacific of Stockton, Cal., hurled the discus 144ft. 2½in., the best mark of the trials.
