Arrayed against him will be Eddie Tolan, University of Michigan's Negro star, and hold-er of the world record, the two Texas streaks-Claude Bracey Rice Institute and Cy Leland Texas Christian University; Hubert Meier of Iowa State, who is cred-ited with having run the century in 9. 2-5s.; Al Toppino of Loyola, New Orleans, and George Hutson Denison
