

WILLIAMS, HALSTEAD SET NEW MARKS IN 440, MILE

Mossman, Churchill Only Bears to Take First Places; Wykoff Victor in 100 and 220

That loud report in the neighborhood of Zack Farmer's Olympic Stadium yesterday afternoon was occasioned by the blowing up of California's track team. Hailed as the best squad the Bears have had in years, the Berkeley boys were buried under an avalanche of points by the University of Southern California team.

The score was 103 to 28. It was a real track meet, the Trojans literally running away with honors by sweeping the mile, 440, high jump and broad jump and failing to do likewise in both hurdle races only because Stokes tumbled in the highs and Martin fell on his ear in the lows.

Dink Templeton, whose Stanford team faces the Trojans in the year's track

classic at Palo Alto, May 2, next, was an interested spectator yesterday. Asked for his observations, Dink replied:

"Southern California is undoubtedly the greatest intercollegiate dual meet team in the country. From now on all dual meets in which the Trojans take part will be a mere formality."

POLITE EXCHANGE

Those who follow their sports will recall that this is substantially the same comment made by Dean Cromwell a week ago after he lamped Templeton's team in action against the L.A.A.C. Dink and Dean are getting quite complimentary in their old age.

California won only two first places, Kenneth Churchill's magnificent heave of 213ft. in the javelin bringing one, and Capt. Spud Mossman's 9m. 49s. two-mile, accounting for the other.

Chesley Unruh, the old Trojan warhorse, who never quits, gave Mossman a race in the long grind and might have won had he started

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to spring sooner. As it was Ulrich finished only four yards behind Moorman.

Vic Williams, national A.A.U. 440 champion, turned in the greatest performance of the day when he won the one-lap gallop in 48 2-32, thus setting a new Southern California record. The old mark of 48 2-32, was made way back in 1921 by George (Speed) Bender, himself a Trojan athlete.

Williams showed tremendous strength yesterday and beautiful form. He allowed his team-mate, Art Woosner, to set the pace, preferring to lag far back until the third turn. Then Vic put on his sprint and how he ran. He caught Woosner at the final curve and sped on to the tape, running with an even, steady stride which fairly ate up the yards.

On the basis of his brilliant showing yesterday Williams will not only beat Al Habies for second at Stanford, but threatens to give Ben Eastman all the running the great Stanford sophomore will want.

Spencer Sparks, California's star sprinter, was the only outstanding Bear entry, aside from Churchill and Moorman, to perform up to standard. Starting swiftly in each race, the California dash artist followed Frank Wykoff to the tape in both 100 and 200. The times were 8.7s. and 31 2-32. Wykoff's margin in the 100 was two yards; in the furlong, slightly more than one.

DELBY FALTERS

Roy Delby, counted on for second in the 100 by Trojan followers, did not show well, getting a third and then losing to Red Guyer for the odd points in the furlong.

Cliff Halstead, Southern California's great miler, ran the best race of his career to set a new Trojan record of 4m. 22 4-32, with Callahan and Learned following him to the tape. Halstead has shown consistent improvement in every race this year. He held the old mark of 4m. 23 3-32.

De Berry flopped terribly in the shot for California, getting but second to Hall where the tall Trojan won with a mediocre put of 46ft. 8 3-4in. De Berry has done 46ft. He failed to place at all in the discus, despite the fact that all three points winners were behind his best throw of the year.

G. Pool, who cleared 13ft. 8 3-4in. by actual measurement two weeks ago, could get no better than a tie for second yesterday at 13ft. 4in. Pete Christensen of Troy won at 13ft.

Despite the absence of Barber and Paul, Southern California swept the broad jump, three neophytes, Van Riper, Johnson and Corrie, bettering 12ft.

Cronwell's sophomore relay team, composed of Charley Parsons, Jr., Don McNeil and Oswald, turned the mile in 3m. 20 3-32, to defeat the Bear batson paragon's equity. Don ran a great lap.

Martin's flop in the low hurdles was a tough one. Dunc Powers, who is generally Troy's third low hurdler, stepped aside yesterday to let Martin try for his letter. The unfortunate Trojan was running in third place when he fell.

TROY FAVORED

As a result of their lopsided victory yesterday the Trojans will be heavy favorites to trim the L.A.A.C. next Saturday. The Mercantiles won over California, 55 1-3 to 45 2-3.
