

HALL, GRABER, M'KENZIE HEROES OF TROY'S WIN

Stanford Sets New National Mark in Winning Relay; Dyer and Wykoff Split Sprints

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STANFORD STADIUM, May 2—The mighty sons of the University of Southern California rose to the heights here today to defeat Stanford in a thrilling meet that went right up to the last event for a decision. The score was 69 to 62, and the blood-curdling battle for points was climaxed by Stanford's new national record of 3m. 14.3-10s. in the one-mile relay.

It was a stirring triumph for the Trojans and Stanford's pill of defeat was sweetened by the new relay mark. Hec Dyer's victory over Frank Wykoff in the 220. Ben Eastman's one-man race in the 880 and his anchor lap that brought new laurels in the baton-passing event.

With two events to go, the relay already having been run, the score was 61 to 50 in favor of the Trojans. The discus and pole vault were being run off simultaneously and the Trojans needed four points in these two events to cinch victory.

A mighty heave by Bob Hall that beat a Stanford man by 3 7-8 inches earned the big Trojan a third place and one point. Graber and Chlentzos had to get three in the pole-vault for victory.

They did—and four more points besides.

CHLENTZOS HELPS

Graber and Chlentzos, the Mexican, and Hall were the last-minute heroes, but away back in the early afternoon a real dark horse named McKenzie broke the Stanford heart.

He exceeded his season's best mark by five feet and won the spear-throwing event with a splendid throw of 131ft. 2 1/2 in. That was 5 points for Dean Cromwell's boys where only one had been awarded them in the northern dope sheets.

The big individual duels of the day on the track went pretty much as expected. Fair-haired Frank Wykoff won the 100 by two yards in 9 8-10s. and Dyer reversed the decision in the 220 by a foot in 21 3-10s.

As predicted, Dink Templeton did not enter Ben Eastman, the sophomore star, in the 440, and Vic Williams, the Trojan senior, won this race after a terrific battle with Ike Hables and Shove in 48 2-10s.

There were at least two fouls in this race. Pearson was nudged

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completely off the track into the infield 100 yards from home and Williams had to bump his way through a box to get between Hables and Shave and out into the open, where he piled up a two-yard lead at the tape.

TIT FOR TAT

Stanford supporters protest that Williams should have been disqualified for shoving Shave (see previous) while Trojan men point out that Hables and Shave outplayed Pearson off the oval entirely.

At any rate Williams went going away, while Hables barely failed to get around plate, a yard ahead of the lightning Woomer, who came up rapidly.

It was a dog-eat-dog race all the way.

While Stanford's relay team set a new record that displaced their own mark made last year by 1-1/20th, the race did not settle the question of individual supremacy between Eastman and Williams in the quarter.

Eastman got off in a three-yard lead on the last lap and finished with two yards of H. Shave, running the first lap, piled up an eight-yard lead on four that the two Hables here prevented Pearson and Woomer from cutting down to more than three yards.

Contrary to expectations the Trojans did not win the meet by upsets on the track but in the field.

The department figured S.C. good for not more than 25 points in the field and 40 on the track.

The Trojans, aided and abetted largely by the dark horse weight of young Mr. McKenzie, looked ten to one for garnering 20 points in the field, while taking a point slip on the track with 25.

Eastman's half-mile race was a thing of beauty and a joy forever. When he came out of the chute he was all by himself, having piled up a lead of twenty yards in the first 100. He ran the first 400 in 22 1-10, and simply coasted home in 1m. 24 1-10.

FITZMAURICE SECOND

He floats along with apparently no effort and makes light of what is work for the other fellow. A surprise here was the second place of Vic Fitzmaurice, who came up with a de-or-die sprint to finish eighteen yards back of Eastman and two yards ahead of his teammate, Ed McHugh.

The first event on the program, the mile, developed along orthodox lines. Halstead took the lead soon after the gun and set his own pace with Brown of Stanford sticking close. Halstead tried to slow down the race in order to pull in either Hammett or Learned in second place. Brown spiked the plan by trying to pass Halstead on the last lap.

Halstead refused to permit this and made Brown run the entire last quarter on the outside of the track. Halstead just toyed with the Stanford runner, letting out all sorts of kicks whenever Brown tried to go by. Halstead turned on the gas in the stretch and beat Brown to the tape by ten yards with the Stanford man twenty yards to the good of Hammett who spurted on the last lap and went by his teammate, Learned. The time was 4m. 20 2-10.

The second event was the widely heralded duel between Frank Wykoff of S.C. and Her Dyer of Stanford. Delby of S.C. and an unknown Stanford man, on the far side of the track got the best of the start, but Wykoff beat them all in with two yards to spare in 2 4-10. Dyer came strong in the last ten yards and nipped Delby for seconds by half a yard.

Then came the 400. Hables had the pole as they came into view from behind the stands with Shave close behind him. Williams was in the rack. As the runners hit the turn 100 yards from home, Williams started to move up. He closed on the leaders but couldn't pass. They had him in a perfect box with his own team-mates jamming him. Francis of S.C. was knocked off the track and quit the race.

As the straight-away was reached Williams passed everyone but Hables and Shave. The latter was running slightly to the rear and right of Hables. The latter was on the pole and Williams behind him. There was only one way for Williams to get through and he took it slightly inside from the tape.

BUSTED THROUGH

He made a terrific lunge and burst into the open between Hables and Shave. Williams outthought Hables to the tape and was going away as the Stanford boy faded and barely outlasted Woomer.

The javelin threw returns trickled in at this stage of the battle, and it produced the first upset with McKenzie consistently throwing over 100 feet and finally getting one out 120m. 2 1-10. Ray's best throw was 100ft. for Stanford.

But Stanford immediately upset the dog basket when Capt. Fudge Smith and Nabet ran one-two for Stanford in the high hurdles. Smith and Nabet were back and neck with a yard over the field at the last flight but Nabet hit a hurdle and barely edged out Bill and Harry of S.C., who tied for third. The time was 22 2-10.

Big Bob Hall did his bit in the shot put and got the second place Trojan supporters hoped he would get, knocking out G. Gray with a toss of 47ft., while Noble Gray was winning at 47ft. 2in.

The two-mile was a heavily fought race, which was won by Callahan of S.C. with six yards to spare, while Astwood of Stanford had ten yards on Dwyer. The time was 1m. 22 2-10. The runners hoveyed back and forth for the lead with Parker, Taylor and Astwood battling French and Callahan for the role of pace setter.

Champion of Handballers to Play Here

Al Harvati, national handball champion, is scheduled to arrive here today from the East for a series of exhibition matches against the pick of the Southland's stars. Harvati has held the national title for the past three years, and during that time has never been defeated. He will play Joe Powers, Los Angeles A.C. champ, Tuesday night at the Elks' Club.

McNAUGHTON WINS

The high jump was a disappointment to Stanford with McNaughton and Stewart of S.C. taking the first two places, the first-jumped Trojan winning with a leap of 6ft. 2 1-10.

Her Dyer got his revenge over Wykoff in the 200, beating the Trojan Dyer by a foot in 22 1-10s, with the remainder of the field more than five yards back. Delby of S.C. getting third. It was a neck-and-neck race all the way down the straightaway, Dyer proving to be the stronger in the last ten yards and flushing into the tape with a superhuman effort.

Baker of S.C. had a beautiful leap of 24ft. 11in. in the broad jump, while Stanford's crippled athlete, Arnie West, broke in for second at 22ft. 9 2-10. Delby of S.C. got the third with 20ft. 2 1-10.

Curis ran a pretty low hurdle and beat Mabel of Stanford by four yards in 22 2-10s. Curis took third two yards back of Mabel.

The weather was perfect, the sun was bright, the track fast and an estimated crowd of 12,000 persons turned out for the meet, one of the most sensational in western track history.
