## S.C. Team Keeps Track Honors

*Local Athletes Pile Up Now  
Point Total to Continue  
Unbeaten Record*

*Hall Takes Two Firsts for  
Winners as Williams  
and Wykoff Win*

STAGG FIELD (Chicago) June 6.

(AP)—Bronzed athletes of the University of Southern California swept into the National Collegiate Athletic Association track-and-field championship today with a record-smashing total of 77 1-7 points.

The Trojans, victorious in all their track-and-field battles this season, won overwhelmingly. Their nearest rival was Ohio State, which scored 31 1-7 points, with Illinois third with 28, Iowa fourth with 26 1-7 and Indiana fifth with 26. Wisconsin was sixth with 23 3-4. Michigan had 20 for seventh, while Iowa State and Miami University, Oxford, O., finished in a tie for eighth with 16 points each. Forty-four of the eighty universities and colleges from twenty-nine States scored in the table of points.

### SET NEW MARK

The Southern Californians, winners of the championship a year ago, hung up a new high-point record today, eclipsing the previous record of 72 points established by Stanford in 1929. The Trojans scored in eleven of the fifteen events, winning four championships and tying for another.

The meet resulted in two record-breaking performances despite wretched conditions. The cinder-path was heavy, due to an all-night rain and the field was soggy and slippery. All afternoon a mist and fog hung over Stagg Field.

The Southern Californians won championships in the 100-yard dash and the 440-yard dash, on the track; the shot put and discus in the field and tied for the pole vault in the air.

Frank Wykoff, the Trojan sprinter, who twice has unofficially run the 100-yard dash in 9.4s., conquered his Negro rival, Eddie Tolan

Vic Williams, intercollegiate quarter-mile champion, who last week tied Ted Meredith's world record of 47.4s., ran a clever race to win the event for Southern California. He stayed back until the stretch, then slipped up the inside and, with a burst of speed, caught and passed James Gordon of Miami University to win by four yards in 48.2s.

### HALL WINS TWO

Bob Hall was a double winner for the Trojans, with victories in the shot put and discus. William Graber, who cleared 145 1/2 in. to win the pole vault in the I.C.A.A. meet last week, gained Southern California's share of a championship in this event. He tied with Tommy Warren of Northwestern, and Verne McDermott of Illinois, in clearing the bar at 135 1/2-140 in., to eclipse Warren's old N.C.A.A. record of 135 1/2-140, hung up last year.

After trailing Wykoff in the century, Tolari came back to run away from his field in the 100-yard dash. The Wolverine won the event four yards ahead of Peyton Glass of Oklahoma Aggies. Tolari's time was 21.3s.

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blond hurdler, and Bob Hall, Trojan weightman, each of whom won two championships. Keller won the 120-yard high hurdles in 14.6s., and scored a lucky triumph in the 220-yard low hurdles when Ernie Payne, Trojan star, stumbled over the last barrier and sprawled face forward on the cinders. Keller beat Bill Carls, another Trojan, in 23.8s.

Hall captured two titles for Southern California with victories in the shot put and discus throw. He tossed the shot 49ft. 9in. In the discus, he won with a heave of 152ft. 7½in.

Dale Letts, University of Chicago, Big Ten half-miler champion, smashed the N.C.A.A. record for the event in the most thrilling distance race of the day. His time, 1:53.5, clipped six-tenths of a second off the record set by Orval Martin of Purdue a year ago. Letts ran his first quarter in 54s.

Clark Chamberlain of Michigan State College, who won the 1930 intercollegiate cross-country title, raced to an impressive easy triumph in the two-mile. His time was 9.23.

Kenneth Churchill of the University of California, America's premier javelin thrower, was in a class by himself, flinching the spear 215 feet, nearly fifteen feet better than the effort of O. E. Nelson of Iowa, who finished second. Ivan Dykeman of Colorado Aggies, was almost as good in the hammer throw, hurling the missile 162ft. 1¼in.

Ed Gordon, Iowa Negro, retained his broad-jump title with a leap of 24ft. 113-8 in., with L. E. Boyle, lone University of Pennsylvania entrant, second, one and one-quarter inches behind. Darrell oJes of Ball State Teachers, Muncie, Ind., became the new high jumping champion when he achieved 6ft. 33-4in.
