

HILL SETS NEW TWO-MILE MARK

*Ex-Oregon Star Runs Race
in 9m. 23 2-5s.*

*Trojans in Easy Win Over
Olympic Club*

*Wykoff Takes Both Dashes;
Woessner Victor*

All by himself Ralph Hill won the two-mile event at Patterson Field yesterday afternoon. This wasn't surprising inasmuch as the former University of Oregon miler, in doing so, set a new Pacific Coast record of 9m. 23 2-5s.

When you run that fast against Far Western competition your bound to be rather lonesome inasmuch as our most energetic eight-lap

lads are fairly looping the loop when they hit around 9m. 40s.

Hill's effort featured the Olympic Club-Southern California meet which the Trojans won as expected, 91½ to 39½, while showing brilliantly in many events where such radiance was rather surprising.

The old Pacific Coast two-mile record of 9m 27.3s was set in 1929 by Sellers of Washington, running against Oregon State at Corvallis. Hill and Sellers are the only Coast men to get under 9m. 30s., at least officially. The ex-Oregon star ran the mile in 4m. 123-5s. two years ago, but is concentrating on the longer grind now in preparation for the Olympic Games.

After visiting his doctor in the morning, Frank Wykoff went out and ran the fastest 94-5s. hundred of his life, and then won the furlong in 213-5s., while looking over his shoulder and talking to his teammates, Roy Delby and Leslie Ball, who were having a bit of difficulty getting to the finish ahead of Montague of the visitors.

Montague won the century at Stanford last week in 9.7s. He was beaten by two and one-half yards yesterday, yet Wykoff's time was announced as 94-5s. My watch showed 93-5s. After the race Frank said "That's the fastest 94-5s. hundred I ever ran." There was a slight wind at his back, as was also the case in the high hurdles, which Joe Bills won in 144-5s., the best time of his career. Bills, Jeddy Welsh and Jimmy Payne finished within inches of each other.

Frank was clocked in 103-5s. Olympic record time for the 100 meters, a tape being stretched at this point beyond the century. The wind was against Wykoff in the furlong and it was a laugh the way he practically ran backward, urging Delby and Ball along. Those races between Frank and Bob Kiesel in the California intercollegiates at Berkeley on May 21 will be worth going miles to witness.

Harry Carter, the old Golden

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Bear star, followed in Cliff Halstead's tracks until the backstretch of the final lap when he stepped out, passing S.C.'s star on the curve and pulling ahead to win by ten yards in 4m. 20.3-5s.

Dick Wehner and Dave Foore of the Trojans ended up in a dead heat in the half-mile, the time of 1m. 56s. being very good for these youngsters. It looks as if both are capable of even better.

Art Woessner provided the comedy relief of the afternoon by running the last half of the 440 with one shoe off and one shoe on. He won in 49 flat. His shoe string broke at the very start but he didn't lose boot until his dogs began to get hot on the backstretch.

Boo Van Osdel cleared 6ft. 4in. in the high jump, showing that he is once more in the splendid form that characterized his leaping two years ago. He almost made 6ft. 6in.

Bill Graber and Dick Barber, Troy's pole vaulting and broad-jumping champions, returned to competition after a long lay-off. Graber won his event with a leap of 13ft. 8in. and appeared to be in excellent condition. Barber took two jumps, one a foul and the other good enough to win at 24ft. 7in.
