

TROJANS EASILY VANQUISH GOLDEN BEAR CINDER TEAM

Wykoff Beats Kiesel in Hundred but Dodges Test in Furlong as Mates Collect, 102 1-3 to 28 2-3

EDWARDS TRACK STADIUM (Berkeley, Cal.) April 2. (AP)—Southern California's Trojans sent California's Bears down to overwhelming 102 1-3 to 28 2-3 defeat here today in a track-and-field meet that lost much of its glamour through the last-minute withdrawal of Frank Wykoff, Trojan sprint ace from the 220-yard dash.

Ten thousand fans assembled for the dedication of California's new \$250,000 stadium, were here mainly to witness the expected duel between Wykoff and Bob Kiesel, sophomore dash star of the Bears.

Wykoff, whose time of 9.4s. is up for recognition as a world's 100-yard dash record, edged out his young rival in the century. It was a neck-and-neck battle, but Wykoff's victory was expected.

In the 220, however, observers had rated Kiesel a good chance to breast the tape before his famed opponent. Just before the field lined up for the dash, it was announced that Wykoff would not run.

INJURED FOOT

Coach Dean Cromwell of Southern California, located in the stands after the meet, said he had withdrawn his charge because he was handicapped by a bad hip and foot.

Kiesel won the race without apparent effort in 21.3s., good time considering the track softened by early morning rain. The stocky Californian, running his first outdoor furlong under competition, outraced two Trojans to lead by six feet at the finish. He ran easily and let down at the tape. Leslie Ball was second and Delby third.

Inches separated Wykoff and Kiesel at the finish of the hundred. The time of 9.8s. was slow, but not bad under existing conditions. California's new hope in the dashes was off to a nice start, despite preseason reports that he was a slow starter.

At the halfway mark he was slightly out in front, but Wykoff came with a rush at about 80 yards to forge into first position. Ball, the Trojan, whom some experts picked to head off Kiesel for second place, ran a close third.

The one-sided victory was expected. Southern California won the national intercollegiate championship for the last two years and the 1932 aggregation is rated practically as strong as preceding ones.

Five clean sweeps marked the smashing triumph of the Trojans. They claimed all positions in the 440-yard run, the 880-yard run, the 220-yard low hurdles and high and broad jumps.

PAIR OF FIRSTS

California only listed two first places, Kiesel's win in the furlong and Fred De Berry's top heave in the shot put.

De Berry, a giant, found himself in the shot to win the event with a heave of 49ft. 7-8in. It was the best mark in his competitive career. The event saw Bob Hall of the Trojans, national intercollegiate champion last year and favorite today, forced to take a poor third, with 46ft. 1-4in. His teammate, Hueston Harper, sent one out around De Berry's distance to take second with 49ft. 3-4in.

As expected, Cliff Halstead, veteran miler of the Trojans, ran off with his event without difficulty. He loped into first position at the halfway mark of the initial lap and finished

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strong to lead Raftery of California by eighteen yards at the tape. Halstead, California intercollegiate champion in 1930 and sixth-place man in the national I.C.A.-A. last year, turned the four laps today in 4m. 28.2s.

The Trojans ran one, two, three in the quarter-mile to chalk up their first clean sweep in the beating of the Bears. Woessner, Ablowich and Guthrie, finishing in the order named, simply ran away from three rivals who were hardly in the race after the first 100 yards. Woessner's time was 49.3s.

Bill Graber, Trojan pole vault star and last year's national intercollegiate champion in the event, was only forced to go 13ft. 3 1-2in. to win. Capt. George Pool of California, who was expected to furnish Graber with competition up to close to 14ft., was disqualified in the preliminaries.
