

# STANFORD STAR STAGES GREAT IRON-MAN STUNT

## Captures Three Races, Including Quarter Mile in 47.1s.; Troy Team Wins by 81 1-4 to 49 3-4

Ben Eastman, the begoggled young man from Stanford, staged an iron man stunt at the Olympic Stadium yesterday that will go down in history as a track epic.

He broke the world's record in the 440 for the second time this year, approached the 800 standard, and glided through the closing leg of the relay in 47.1.

Sliding Ben runs as if he had wheels concealed in his legs.

He electrified 15,000 fans on a sunny afternoon by running the 440 in 47.1s. and the 800 in 1m. 12.1s. The 440 mark is three-tenths second better than the world record held by Ted Meredith for sixteen years, but is back of the one Sliding Ben established in a meet at Stanford earlier in the year—46.7s. This will be up for approval by the International Federation this summer.

He won the 440 by nine yards from Art Worcester and beat Weber and Foote to the tape three yards in the 800. Worcester jumped into a lead on the last lap of the relay and fought hard, but Eastman just turned the crank on the wheels and eased into the tape without any apparent effort.

### THE BIG SHOW

Eastman's brilliant, amazing performance was the big feature of the annual dual meet between Southern California and Stanford.

Southern California was, as forecast, by a score of 81 1-4 to

81 1-4. But this was a secondary matter. The big noise was Eastman.

All eyes were on him when he started the 440 in the second lane with Worcester on the pole. Off to a staggered start Eastman had caught everybody at the half-way mark. From there he continued to pile up the yards on Worcester.

In the 800 he coasted back in the rack and let Bill McLaughlin set a hot pace. Eastman tried to pass at the 100 mark. McLaughlin stepped on the gas, and Eastman dropped back. This proved to annoy Ben, and when they hit the 600 post Eastman dipped his shoulders, the blood, telltale looks on the back of his head agitated violently, and he glided or like a ghost.

### ANOTHER PHANTOM

The 440 of "Phantom" bestowed on Paul Weber could just as easily be pinned on Eastman. Both of these great stars ran as easily as the average guy runs a dash of ice cream on a warm day.

Dick Weber of S.C. said he never ran so fast in his life as he did in the 440 yesterday, and he wasn't in it—fifteen yards back.

Eastman stole the show, but another world's champion ran true to form when Frank Wyhoff walked off with both the 100 and 220, getting competition only from his team-mates—Ball in the 100 and Delby in the 220.

Wyhoff nipped out Ball by two feet in the shorter dash in 8.7s. and won from Delby by five feet in the hair-long. Lee Haines, sick Stanford sprinter, was unable to place, and Giberson of Stanford took the third place in the 100. But in the 220 the Trojans grabbed all the places, Ball nipping Giberson in the last ten yards.

### SIX BLANKS

Competition was very one-sided in several events, there being six clean sweeps. The Trojans engineered five of these—high hurdles, 220, low hurdles, high jump and broad jump—while Stanford managed all the points in the shot put.

One of the surprises of the day was the failure of Gus Meter of
