

TROJANS TRIM TIGERS

Dave Foore Runs Mile in 4m. 27s. as S.C. Squad Wins Handicap Track Meet From Occidental

Sweeping both hurdles and the quarter-mile, the University of Southern California track and field team made it's 1933 dual-meet debut yesterday afternoon by defeating Occidenta, 82 1-3 to 57 1-3, in a handicap event at Patterson Field.

Dean Cromwell, veteran Trojan coach, put a well-rounded squad on the cinders and despite liberal handicaps the Tigers were unable to keep pace with their big league foes. S.C., however, showed great weakness in the 880, two-mile and discus and will need considerable improvement in these events to compete on even terms with Stanford in the weeks to come.

Bob Lyon, Jeddy Welsh and Clarence Berry ran one-two-three in the tall timbers, with Lyon winning against a strong wind in 15.2s.

PAUL SHINES

Norman Paul, Ed Hall and Pliny Barnes swept the lows. Paul's time was 23.8s., very fast traveling, but he was aided somewhat by a shifting cross-wind which at times blew the runners down the track.

Ed Ablowich, Bob Reed and Carl Andree took care of the three point-getting places in the 440, with the winner's time 50.2s.

Charley Parsons, after losing the 100 to his team-mate, Les Ball, in 10s. flat, came back to win the furlong in 21.2s., which is radiating rapidity with the

best of them. The trailing wind was of some help to Parsons here, but he gave evidence of brilliant running in this event by outdistancing Todd and Hull of Occidental, who had been awarded eight and twelve-yard handicaps. Charley just naturally had to step along to overtake these lads.

Ball had a one-yard handicap in the 100 and beat Parsons, who ran from scratch, in both races by slightly less than this margin. The two Trojans came with a terrific burst of speed in the last twenty-five yards to overtake Todd and Hull, the latter getting third.

McKENZIE SHINES

Kenneth McKenzie of the Trojans turned in a great javelin toss of 201ft. 83-4in., but here again the wind helped make the record outstanding. McKenzie's best throw up to yesterday was 193ft. at Chicago two years ago. Joe Forbes of Oxy did 182ft., which is about eight feet better than anything he ever did before, indicating the way in which the wind aided the athletes.

Perhaps the best all-around

performance of the day was that of Dave Foore, who is being juggled around in the 880, mile and two-mile by Cromwell. Dave did not win the four-lap jaunt yesterday, but ran the distance in 4m. 27.3-5s., which made Cromwell quite happy. The event went to Lennington of Oxy in 4m. 22.4s., accounted for by his 150-yard handicap, which was just a wee bit too much for Foore to combat.

Paul Jungkeit and Olson of Troy each cleared 23ft. in the broad jump, but Entwistle's handicap of one foot, plus a fine leap of 22ft. 11.3-4in., gave him first place by half an inch over Jungkeit.

From an Occidental standpoint Jack Hallat and Byron Kelley were the fair-haired boys. The former set a new college record of 13ft. 3.1-8in. in the pole vault. This also bettered the existing Southern California Conference mark of 13ft. 2.3-4in. made by McAllister of Whittier last year. Hallat was beaten by Bill Garber of S.C. for first place, the Trojan vaulter clearing 13ft. 6in. for the first time this season.

Kelley fussed around with the hammer and finally heaved it 141ft. 3.1-4in. for a new Occidental mark. The Tigers swept this event, S.C. having no entries here.

McNAUGHTON BEATEN

Duncan McNaughton, Olympic Games high-jump champion, could do no better than 6ft. 1in. and this gave him only a tie for third with two team-mates. Liberal handicaps allowed Ferguson and Clever of Oxy gave them a tie for first at 6ft. 2in. Ferris Webster ran only a so-so

half mile, 2m. flat to be exact, and lost to Nemser of Oxy, who turned the distance in 1m. 58.4s. with the aid of a forty-yard handicap.
