

TROJAN VARSITY WRECKS ALL-STAR FOES EASILY

Abbott Takes Fifth in Hundred, Parsons Takes Furlong, Foore Runs Great Two-Mile

Dean Bartlett Cromwell, who, like the old woman in the shoe, has so many athletes he doesn't know what to do, juggled the boys around at the Coliseum yesterday afternoon for the benefit of 10,000 free spectators and came up with a number of sparkling performances.

The Dean's Trojan varsity [†]velt High lad. After running last trimmed an aggregation of all-stars, alumni and freshmen by the score of 80 to 46 and looked very formidable while so doing. On their showing yesterday the S.C. boys should beat Stanford in both dual meets this year. With Eastman out Troy's win is a certainty. With Ben running the meets would be close.

Dave Foore appeared as Troy's leading two-miler yesterday and lived up to that reputation by negotiating the eight-lap grind in 9m. 44.2s. This is nothing short of remarkable, considering that it was Dave's debut as a two-miler. Last year he ran the 880 and this season he has been concentrating on the mile. Unable to discover any decent eight-lap lads and with Francis Benavidez showing steady improvement in the mile, Cromwell decided Foore would have to be his "white hope" against the Indians and Dave proved yesterday that he will be all of that.

The Trojan distance star was given a terrific battle by Frank Lydic, former national junior mile champ, and Wall, the former Roose-

For most of the way, Lydic moved to the front on the final lap and tore down the back stretch with a stride which quickly put him 30 yards ahead of Foore and Wall. It looked like a cinch for Frank, but it soon became evident that he had shot his bolt a bit prematurely and Foore's furious finish carried him to victory when Lydic all but fell apart on the last turn. Wall was a strong second only a stride behind Foore.

Ron Johnson, the best half-miler in these parts, gave the Trojan lads something to shoot at in the 880 and won with a driving finish in the excellent time of 1m. 56.6s. Johnson is a strong runner, knows the game like a book and is a cool competitor. He can run much faster and will do so if afforded the competition.

The surprise of the 880 was the showing of James Cassin, a revamped Trojan quarter-miler, who finished second to Johnson and was timed in 1m. 57.4s. With Ferris Webster not coming along as expected, the half-

mile debut of Cassin afforded Cromwell no little satisfaction.

Webster appeared in the mile but failed to finish. Cliff Halstead, the old warhorse of Troy, gave Benavidez a good race but the little fellow had too much finish for Cliff and won in 4m. 28.6s.

Charley Parsons ran his best century of the season to defeat a fast field including Frank Wykoff and Red Abbott, the frosh star. Parsons was two yards in front of Wykoff and Ball, who tied for second, at the finish and his time was 9.7s. Abbott had to be content with fifth behind Koenig. The big chap tied up a bit in this race.

He came back nicely in the furlong, however, and appeared to have won the race from Parsons in 21.2s., but the judges ruled the other way around. Parsons came with a rush at the close and this probably influenced the official pickers.

Johnny McCarthy, doped to extend Ablowich in the quarter, did so until the final turn and then quit, unable to get any air, he said later. Ablowich's time was a shade under 49s. flat.

Harper tossed the shot 49ft. 10½in., showing that his put of better than 50ft. last week was no accident.
