

SEFTON STARS AS TROY WINS TRACK HONORS

Frosh Clears 14ft. Again

Due to lack of competition on the track yesterday's meet at the Coliseum fell flatter than a bride's first batch of biscuits. The collection of alumni, freshmen and other miscellaneous athletes who opposed Southern California won only two running races and Dean Cromwell's charges chalked up a lop-sided victory, 76 2-3 to 49 1-3.

Had it not been for some very timely help from the Trojan peagreeners the all-stars would have been even more soundly spanked. Bill Sefton and Roy Staley accounted for two of the five first places won by the old-timers and demonstrated in no uncertain fashion that they will be mainstays of the S. C. varsity next season.

SECOND TIME IN WEEK

For the second time in a week, Sefton cleared 14ft. in the pole-vault. Yesterday he was far too good for Bill Graber, holder of the unofficial world's record at 14ft. 4 3-8in. The ex-Trojan captain could do only 13ft. to tie for third place. Sefton has great strength in his shoulders and, as has been said before, is a cinch to break the world's record some day.

Staley romped over the high hurdles to defeat all the varsity athletes in 15.2s.

Frank Wykoff appeared as advertised and had no trouble taking the measure of the best Trojan sprinters. Driving down from Atascadero in the morning, Frank raced over the 100-yard route in 9.9s., to win by a little more than a yard over Laury Osburn, who surprised by hitting the tape ahead of Red Abbott, who had to be content with third place.

Wykoff did not run the 220, which Abbott won in 21.4s., but Frank did

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take part in the broad jump, leaping 22ft. 5in. to show that he still can shove himself through space.

Estel Johnson revealed that he has something to learn about running the half-mile. He scored the first lap in 52s. and then roared around the track in 55.4s. to come home an easy winner in 1m. 57.4s. Last week he did 1m. 55.9s. at Occidental. Johnson probably learned a lesson and will run his first lap 58s. or better hereafter. He has the stuff and will prove it before the season ends.

BENAVIDEZ WINS

Francis Benavidez had too much kick at the finish for Wally Monroe and won by about twelve yards in 4m. 27.3s., after the tall, redhead apparently had the race won going around the final turn. Joe McNabb, ex-Bell high-school lad, took third when Ward Hardman, late of Annapolis, faded after leading for more than two laps.

Monroe was a pleasant surprise. He used to run the 880 rather exclusively while attending Long Beach Jaycee, winning the jaycee crown in this event. This is his first year at S.C. and most of us never even knew he was there. With a little more build-up he looks capable of doing around 4m. 20s.

Roy Staley, State and Southern California interscholastic high hurdle champion, won the high sticks in 15.2s. by a whisker over Clarence Barry of the varsity. Staley, second best fresh hurdler at S.C., with Phil Cope the ace, finished strong to maintain a brief lead over Berry. Bob Lyon of the Trojan varsity, 1933 I.C.A.A.A. champ, was third, with Juddy Welsh fourth. It was Lyon's first public start of the year. He faded a bit at the tape.

ALL BY HIMSELF

The quarter-mile was a one-man race featuring the broad-chested John McCarthy, who merely coasted through to hit the tape in 48.8s. Glenn Baker, another Trojan runner, sped alongside McCarthy for most of the way, but faded coming around the final turn. Edgar Allowich, in his first open start of the year, gave chase to McCarthy after rounding the final curve, but John was too far ahead and won by eight yards, pulled up. McMunn, a Trojan sophomore who hails from Texas, was third.

Troy's two-mile twins, Fred Lantz and Everett Winn, who not only run alike but are of similar stature, dog-trotted the last lap of the long grind and hit the tape simultaneously in the very excellent time of 9m. 48.8s. This exhibition served to make the afternoon a very pleasant one for Coach Crosswell, for it was apparent that either of the boys could have cut ten or more seconds off their time yesterday.

Red Abbott beat Al Fitch by less than a yard in the 220-yard dash, with Charley Parsons third. The time was announced as 21.4s., with one watch having 21.3s. McCarthy also ran this race and finished fifth behind Oeburn.
