

TROJANS MASSACRE DONS AS GOOD MARKS HUNG UP

Visitors Get Only Three Firsts as S.C. Sweeps Seven Events to Win Meet by 109-to-22 Score

The grunlion started running yesterday, which probably explains why we had the Trojan-S.F.U. track meet at the Coliseum. From the standpoint of competition the frisky fishies frequently found floundering along the water front are far more fun.

Southern California, as anticipated, scored a lopsided victory, 109 to 22, the Dons even failing to get the 25 points so magnanimously awarded them in advance by most of the critics. If local authorities are trying to build up track and field they have adopted a peculiar way of inciting public interest. You could have put all the spectators in a telephone booth and still have had ample room for Oliver Hardy, even if he brought Stan Laurel along with him.

Two or three good races almost saved the day. Estel Johnson had to run the half-mile in 1m. 55.7s. to catch Fred Walts of S.F.U. Walts led all the way and when challenged by Johnson on the back stretch put on one of those "they-shall-not-pass" demonstrations that had the bugs biting their nails. It took Johnson all the rest of the race to get the lead and both were staggering all over the track as they hit the tape little more than a yard apart.

Running under orders, Jawn McCarthy stayed behind Alvin Fitch for most of the 440 and then got tired of the horse play and went out and won in 48.1s., coasting easily at the finish. Jawn has been holding himself in for so long that he's liable to burst if they don't let him really run a race pretty soon. Fitch showed great promise, being under 49s.

Charley Parsons didn't get away as swiftly as Red Abbott in the 100, but the blond boy had more kick at the finish than his cardinal-thatched rival, winning by an eyelash in 9.9s. One of the pleasant surprises of the day was the fine sprinting of little Foy Draper, who wasn't more than a foot behind in the hundred and then beat Parsons in a 21.2s. furlong.

Fred Lantz and Everett Winn, Ike and Mike of the Trojan team, put on their two-mile act again, hitting the tape almost together in 9m. 53.3s. As a matter of fact, Winn won, but the affair was called a tie. The boys can shave ten or more seconds off this time, as they completed seven laps in 8m. 40s. yesterday.

The Trojans swept seven events, with such men as Norman Paul, Ken Carpenter, Monroe, Osburn, Williamson and Strother either on the side lines or competing in events with no intention of doing their

Charley Hunter's Dons came through with three first places. Bill Alley turned in a fine jump of 6ft. 4 1-8in. to defeat Will Brannan, who got second at an inch lower.

Charley Stith won the low hurdles in 24s. flat by outsprinting Hall after the two had cleared the last hurdle almost together.

Schmidt tossed the discus 151ft. and this was more than enough to beat the Trojan entries.

Most of the marks were excellent—the competition a farce.
