

MARTY FAILS TO BREAK RECORD AS TROJANS WIN

the gas and loafed in. At this point the watches showed 3m. 5s. Jawn can do that last forty yards in about five or six seconds, which gives you some idea of what is going to happen to the world's mile relay record of 3m. 12.6s. established by Stanford at Fresno on May 8, 1931.

Consider that Reed and Guthrie are seconds slower than Ed Ablowich and Al Fitch, who will ultimately join Tompkins and McCarthy, and you can see that Stanford's world mark is going to fall when the Trojans decide to go after it in earnest. This may happen at the Fresno Relays next month.

McCarthy showed that he is about ready for his test race with Jimmy LuValle next Saturday by winning the open 440 in 47.6s., the fastest time he has registered this year. LuValle's best record this season is 47.4s. Tompkins set the pace yesterday and was followed by Fitch, Ablowich and McCarthy in that order as they passed the main grand stand. On the back stretch Ablowich moved ahead of Fitch and then McCarthy stepped on the gas and went into first place, winning easily without straining.

Ablowich was timed in 48s. flat. Flint Hanner, Fresno coach, says he caught his best man, Harris, who was fifth behind Tompkins and Fitch, in 48.8s. Imagine having that good a runner go unplaced in a dual meet! Fitch was almost fouled a couple of times during the race and this hurt his speed.

Foy Draper, Troy's tiny sprint star, continued his steady improvement to win the 100-yard dash in a sound 9.8s. by a whisker over Charley Parsons. Lorry Osburn was third. Red Abbott did not run. Parsons won the furlong with Draper second. The time was 21.4s.

Bob Lyon had the high hurdles all won but hit the last barrier and was fortunate to regain his footing in time to finish third behind Eugene Culp, a team-mate, and Ward of Fresno, who were neck and neck at the tape, with the former getting the decision in 15s. flat.

Several of the Trojans who are being counted on for points against Stanford next month showed improvement yesterday. Ablowich won the low hurdles in 24s. flat. Three boys cleared 23ft. in the broad jump. Chrisman boosted his discus spinning to 145ft. Thurlow did 184ft. to take second behind White of Fresno in the javelin. Red Quinn was ill and did not throw.
