

BEAR YEARLING SETS RECORD; TIES ANOTHER

Graber, Sefton Share Honors

George Anderson, sensational University of California freshman sprinter, shared the limelight at the Coliseum last night with four Trojan dash men during the staging of the annual Southern Pacific A.A.U. meet before 10,000 fans.

The powerful and fast traveling Golden Bear star won both the 100 and 200-meter dashes, broke one local record and tied another. In the shorter race he had a margin of slightly more than one yard over Foy Draper of the University of Southern California. Judges decided that Mushy Pollock of Riverside was third, Vincent Reel of Occidental fourth, Frank Wykoff, fifth and Charlie Parsons of the Trojans sixth. From my seat in the press box, situated directly on the finish line, it appeared that the judges gave Wykoff and Parsons the worst of it. Both Pollock and Reel admitted that Wykoff had beaten them, while Parsons, running in lane one, was completely overlooked by officials when he should have had no worse than fourth. Anderson's time for the distance was 10.4s., tying the district record set by Wykoff in 1932.

BURST OF SPEED

In the 200-meter dash Anderson showed a tremendous burst of speed at the finish to defeat Draper by narrow squeak. The midge Trojan sprinter had a one-yard edge at the 100-meter mark but could not hold this lead. Anderson's time of

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21.1a. broke the district record of 21.4a. set by Hector Dyer in 1932. The California sprinter is undoubtedly a great athlete and much can be expected of him in the future. In defeating such outstanding men as he did last night Anderson proved his right to a high rating.

Four Trojan sprinters established a new world's record for the 800-yard relay. The runners were Draper, Al Fitch, Red Abbott and Parsons. They negotiated the half-mile in 1m. 24.8a. to clip a full second off the old mark of 1m. 25.8a. set by a Southern California team in 1927. Opposition last night was furnished by an all-star pick-up team including Pollock, Wyckoff, Adrian Tally and Anderson. The latter ran the last furlong against Parsons and turned on the heat to make up all but one yard of a six-yard handicap.

Bill Graber and Bill Sefton staged a thrilling duel in the pole vault and finally wound up tied at 14ft. with neither able to clear 14ft. 6in. on three tries each. Graber came closest to a new world's record and still looks like the best vaulter of them all.

FILM STARS PRESENT

Much eclat was supplied by the presence of motion-picture stars who presented gold watches to the first-place winners of all events.

Louis Zamperini, the Torrance High School boy who set a new world's prep record in the mile two weeks ago, conquered all the so-called "big shots" in the 1500-meter run last night. The little high school boy bided his time until the last lap when he cut loose with a terrific sprint to take the lead away from Frank Lydic, former L.A.A.C. runner. Lydic in turn was passed by Ferris Webster for second place at the finish.

Some of the kick went out of the high hurdles when neither Bob Lyon, Trojan ace, nor Roy Kirkpatrick, El Centro High School sensation, showed up for the event. With the two favorites absent Roy Staley of the Trojan freshmen nosed out Phil Cape by inches at the tape to win in 14.2a.

Johnny McCarthy, best of the Trojan quarter-milers, had little trouble winning the 400-meter event in 48a. flat. Resorting to his old tactics McCarthy coasted through the first furlong and then finished with a burst of speed around the last turn to take the lead away from his team-mate, Edgar Ablowich, and finish with four yards to spare. Al Creal of Caltech was third.

One of the best races of the evening from the standpoint of competition was the 800-meter run in which Ross Bush, Trojan freshman who holds the world's interscholastic 880-yard run record of 1m. 54a., nosed out Capt. Jimmy Miller of the Bruin varsity by mere inches in the sensational time of 1m. 52.4a. Bush broke the Southern California A.A.U. record of 1m. 53.8a. set by Charles Sansone in 1932. Estel Johnson, the favorite, held the lead until the next to the last turn when Bush and Miller began a battle which lasted right up to the tape. Bush's showing last night indicated that he may some day break the world's record of 1m. 49.8a. established by Tom Hampson of Great Britain in the 1932 Olympics. Johnson faded badly and finished out of the money. It was Miller's first middle-distance race and he looms as a threat in the N.C.A.A.

Francis Benavidez captured the 2000-meter run in 8m. 24.8a. He had too much sprint for the rest of the field and finished twenty-five yards ahead of Eldridge Rice of Compton Jaycee.
