

HARRY HINKLE CRACKS WALK RECORD AGAIN

MILWAUKEE (Wis.) June 29. (AP)

A determined assault by athletes in the junior division in the American outdoor track and field championships at Marquette University stadium this afternoon and tonight wrote new records into the books and provided a sensational prelude to the senior championships to be decided tomorrow.

In addition to the junior records a new mark was established in the 5000-meter senior walk.

Olympic Club athletes of San Francisco won the team championship with 24 points. They succeeded the Texas Neighborhoods, winners of the junior championships at Chicago last year. The New York A.C. finished second with 16 points, followed in this order by the Pittsburg (Kan.) Teachers with 12 Chicago Parks with 11 and the Denver Athletic Club with 10.

THEODORATOS STARS

Victor Malin, for two years Yale's football center, competing for the New York A.C., took the high individual scoring honors with two firsts, acquiring 10 points. He won the hammer throw with a toss of 159ft. 8in. and the fifty-six-pound weight with a peg of 27ft. 8in.

Second high scoring honors went to George Theodoratos, Washington's State's football giant and boxing champion, who scored 9 points on a first in the shotput with a record-breaking heave of 53ft. 4 8-10in., a fourth in the discus with 141ft. 3 6-10in., and a second in the fifty-six-pound weight.

The championships were widely divided with the East winning five, the Midwest five, Far West five, and the South and Southwest four. Besides, the Midwest, Far West and South shared in two others. Twenty-one events comprised the championship program.

DRAPER SETS RECORD

Foy Draper, Los Angeles, established a new junior record in the 200 meters around one turn, by winning the event in

21.6s. The former record, made in the same time, was hung up by James Johnson, Illinois State Normal, on a straightaway in 1933.

Harry Hinkle of the Los Angeles A.C. smashed his own record in winning the senior 5000-meter walk in 22m. 56.8s., to wipe out his mark of 23m. 5.4s., made in the championships a year ago.

Another Pacific Coast athlete, John Mottram, representing the Olympic Club of San Francisco, cracked the junior record in the javelin throw. He threw the spear 207ft. 9.6in. to eclipse the record of 204ft. 4 1/4-in. established by Nathan Blair of Louisiana State in 1933.

The new 1934 junior 100-meter champion is Morris Pollock of Riverside (Cal.) Junior College. He won the event in 16.6s., defeating Louis Salvato of the Olympic Club, San Francisco, rated as one of the fastest sprinters on the Pacific Coast. He is a student at San Jose (Cal.) State College and has only been beaten by Bob Kiesel, California's outstanding varsity sprinter.

Jimmy Jessel, who just completed his sophomore year at Marquette University, ran the field into the ground in the 400 meters by breaking the tape in record-breaking time of 48.6s., to eclipse the old record of 49.2s. set by Merrill Hershey of Michigan Normal in 1933. Jessel beat back a closing challenge by Howard Green of Abilene Christian College, who almost closed a five-yard gap on the stretch. Jessel won by inches.

FISHER TRIUMPHS

George Fisher, Louisiana State University, who apparently won the national collegiate high hurdles at Los Angeles last week only to be disqualified when the motion pictures were viewed, won the junior 110-meter hurdles in the rather slow time of 15s.

W. Williamson of the University of North Carolina won the 1500-meter run in a stretch sprint with William Daly of the University of Detroit in 4m. 1.5s. Daly had a thirty-yard lead going into the final turn.
