

JESSE BOWS TO PEACOCK

Temple Athlete Sets Records

*Eulace Jumps 26ft. 3in. in
Broad Jump and Hits
10.2s. in Sprint*

LINCOLN (Neb.) July 4. (AP)—Eulace Peacock, a 20-year-old Negro sophomore from Temple University, fired off a staggering assortment of fireworks this Independence Day to bedim Ralph Metcalfe's title as "fastest human" and smash the spectacular drive to all-time track and field honors of Jesse Owens in the senior championships of the Amateur Athletic Union.

Although ranked as one of the country's better sprinters and broad jumpers, Peacock, nevertheless, was regarded as an outsider against Metcalfe and Owens today.

But he almost created a case of mass hysterics by first beating Metcalfe in the classic 100 meters in the world record time of 10.2s., and coming back to wrench from Owens the great Ohio State University Negro's broad jump title. Peacock made the prize leap of his career on his last trial, 26ft. 3in. Owens eked out only a third in the 100 and second in the jump.

DRAMATIC RACE

The 100 meters, from all angles, was about as dramatic as anything this championship of championship meets has produced in years. Metcalfe and Owens, the men picked to fight it out for "fastest human" honors, qualified easily. So did Peacock, but still little attention was directed his way. So high was interest in the 100 meters among the 15,000 spectators, that almost no attention was directed to the final of the 3000 meters walk, which came just before the dash.

The tension was increased as the field in the final, even more jittery than the spectators, broke four times as Starter Johnny McHugh tried to get them away. McHugh finally walked over and talked to the finalists, then tried again. This time they got away in perfect order.

At the 65-meter mark, Metcalfe and Owens still appeared to be the real contenders. Metcalfe, the big, powerhouse type of sprinter, forged into a slight lead. The flowing, easy running Owens was at his shoulder. Peacock was about a meter back. They blazed to within 35 meters of home in that order, in adjoining lanes.

Then Peacock turned on the gas. With a terrific rush that came so

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suddenly that the very surprise of it carried Metcalfe and Owens with him for a few paces, Peacock shot into the lead. He never stopped pumping and broke through the frail cotton string at the finish with about a foot advantage over Metcalfe.

Owens was third, inches back, and George Anderson of the University of California and the Olympic Club, was fourth, less than two yards back of Owens.

Owens, who had crashed through the Big Ten, Central Intercollegiate and N.C.A.A. title meets without a defeat in either of the dashes, the low hurdles or the broad jump, still had another chance to salvage some of the glory. Tired from his long, spectacular campaign in college meets, he withdrew from the 300 meters to concentrate on his first love, the broad jump.

A jump of 36ft. 2 1/2 in. on his next to last attempt apparently had given the Ohio State sophomore his coveted triumph. But, along came Peacock again.
