

TROJANS IN TRACK WIN

*Startling Performance as
S. C. Team Whips All-Star
Cinder Outfit*

It was all work and no play but lots of fun for the Trojan track team yesterday as the Southern California squad swept to a 97-44 victory over an aggregation of All-Stars composed of old-timers and Trojan freshmen and ineligibles.

The affair, held at the Coliseum, drew about 2000 fans who kept the huge bowl resounding all afternoon with their "ohs" and "ahs," as the astounding and remarkable performances were recorded.

BEST MARKS

Offhand the mile and quarter-mile races were the best of the day. Thin-legged Francis Benevidez trailed the field in the mile, cutting loose on the last lap to win in 4m. 21.4s. That time should cast fear into the hearts of the

Golden Bears who meet the Trojans next Saturday in the Coliseum.

However, the worst is yet to come. Freddie Lantz took second to Benny in 4m. 22s., with Pete Zamperini snatching third in 4m. 26.6s. The second and third-place times are, of course, unofficial but fairly accurate.

BAD NEWS

Then came the quarter-mile with bad news in large letters for the Bears. Johnny McCarthy won his first race of the year and looked like his old self in doing so. Official time was 48s., although some said it was even faster. Jimmy Cassin finished like a deer fleeing before the huntsmen's dogs, to take second inches behind the flying McCarthy. Ron Johnson, all-star entrant, took third when Al Fitch slowed up after McCarthy and Cassin passed him on the back stretch.

Other surprising Trojans times included Phil Cope's 14.6s. win in the high hurdles; Foy Draper hitting 21.1s. in the furlong; Ross Bush's 1m. 56.7s. half mile and Ed Hall's 23.6s. flight of the low sticks.

LOSES HUNDRED

Draper lost the hundred to Mack Robinson, colored Muir Tech speedster. The time was 9.7s. and there wasn't more than a foot between the first three, Robinson, Draper and George Boone, the lithe-hipped sophomore.

Very encouraging to Trojan fans was the performance of Bid Spicer in the high jump. Bid cleared 6ft. 2½in. to give the Trojans hope of winning against California.

The "circus" event of the day was the pole vault. Bud Deacon, the generallissimo of the All-Stars, won at 14ft. and then got frisky. He raised the bar to 14ft. 5in. and missed three times coming mighty close on his last two attempts. Bud then decided that as long as he was feeling fine he would try 14ft. 10in. so the standards were extended as far as they would go into the dark sky. Bud tried again and missed, which was no surprise to anyone.

WANTS NEW POLE

"Some day I'll probably make that height," said Deacon, after the

meet. "And I just wanted to see how it looked. I was afraid of my pole today. It's too weak and I was afraid it would crack. I'm saving my nickels for one of those metal poles and then I hope to get that world's record."

Deacon has put on twenty pounds since his vaulting days at Stanford and threatens to steal "Tarzan" honors from Estel Johnson.

Other items of interest gathered on the run . . . Roy Staley smacked a hurdle and didn't finish in the high sticks . . . Earl Meadows didn't vault because of a sore foot . . . Al Olson didn't broad jump for the same reason . . . Harry Tompkins won't be ready to run until the Stanford meet . . . Norman Paul coasted to take third in the lows. His time was 24.6s. . . Bill Brown did 14.8s. or better to take second in the highs . . . McNeil, supposed to be the best Trojan high jumper, went out at 5ft. 10in. . . Quinn, the leading varsity javeline tosser, did around 175ft. . . Mack Robinson has yet to be beaten in the 100, he always runs to win, not for time, he says. Yesterday's 9.7s. is his fastest mark . . . McCarthy says this is his year, watch him go. Summary:
