

TWENTY-MAN TEAM SURE OF CHAMPIONSHIP TODAY

LuValle and Murphy Quality as Bears and Stanford Help Troy Dominate Trials

CAMBRIDGE (Mass.) May 31. (Exclusive)—A superlative team from the land of superlatives, the University of Southern California, made good the boast that it was the strongest combination ever sent East from the Coast by virtually clinching the fifty-ninth annual championship of the Intercollegiate A.A.A.A. today.

In the dull gloom of the Harvard Stadium, the Trojans performed the hitherto unprecedented feat of qualifying every one of their athletes for tomorrow's finals. So firmly entrenched in the lead is the red-jerseyed brigade from Los Angeles that nothing short of a cataclysm of the first order can stop its surging rush to its seventh title.

ALL TROJANS QUALIFY

Southern California qualified sixteen men out of sixteen and has four more automatically advancing to the finals.

Quite in keeping with this stirring example the three other Coast colleges came through with achievements not far behind.

California's Golden Bears suffered only one casualty in qualifying eight men.

A four-man team from Stanford's defending champions took five places and U.C.L.A. sent ahead both its foot-racers.

The East could not even begin to match that. Third in total qualifiers behind Trojans and Bears came the University of Pittsburgh with six men, while Harvard and Cornell could do no better than tie Stanford for fourth position with five.

FEW UPSETS

It was a day surprisingly free from upsets and records.

The matchless precision and efficiency of the amazing Californians took care of the first item and the wind handled the second in rough fashion. Old marks were touched six times but the caprices of a puffy breeze nullified half of them.

The two best accomplishments of the day survived, however. Ben Johnson, the little Columbia Negro, and George Anderson, the big, powerful sprinter from California, each slammed down the grey cinder straightaway during a lull in the wind to shatter the old figures of 9:10.8 for 100 meters with twin 9:35.5 achievements.

BREEZE BALKS HIM

But when Johnson attempted to add the 200-meter standard to his century feat the breeze balked him. He was caught in his flat only to have the wind machine toss it into the discard. The same thing happened to Phil Cope of Southern California when he broke the 110-meter high-hurdles record in 6:14.6 and to Phil Good of Bowdoin when he tied the old mark at 6:14.7.

In one respect, though, Good was fortunate. He was forced to run an extra heat and he did it in 6:14.7 again. There was no wind at the time and he was credited the equaled record. Even at that it was more or less humiliating for the defending champion to have to go through an additional trial to reach the final. But then this was not a particularly suspicious day for defending champions—unless they happened to be Californians.

O'DELL TRAILING

Hop O'Dell of Manhattan, two-time winner of the javelin throw, was in third place by the time a heavy rainstorm completed the picture of shattered eastern hopes at the finish of the day. Ahead of him was Johnny Mottram of Stanford, twice a failure in the past but apparently certain to come into his own this trip.

The lone defending ruler to emerge with laurels intact was Sam Klobstock of Stanford in the low hurdles. The Cardinal timber-topper won his heat with ridiculous ease and, when he was forced to re-run it because one of the flights of sticks was out of place, loafed in to take second place.

Fittingly enough three of the nine to gain doubles were native sons. There was Anderson in the two sprints, and Klobstock and Tom Moore of California in the two hurdles. The others were Johnson and John Kunitzky of N.Y.U. in the sprints; Eddie O'Brien of Syracuse in the 300 and 400; Anton Klison of Bates in hammer and discus; Duke Wood of Cornell in shot and discus and Good in the two timber-copping tests.

Outside of some uniformly excellent performances the most striking

feature of the day was the way the combined Californians dominated the meet. First place in either heats or qualifying rounds went in this statistical order:

Southern California with two in the high hurdles, one in the discus throw, one in the 800, one in the 200-meter dash, one in the broad jump and two in the low hurdles; California with one in the shot, one in the century, one in the 220 and one in the low hurdles; Stanford with one in the javelin, and U.C.L.A. with one in the 400.

Never before has there even been anything resembling this sweep. Only in the hammer throw where they had no entries did the far-westerners fail to be at the head of the procession.

LUVALLE SPARKLES

One of the outstanding efforts of the day was that of Jimmy LuValle of U.C.L.A. in the 400. The Coast Negro, back on the eastern front after a year's absence, came mighty close to his own intercollegiate record of 46.9s. with a lazy metric quarter in 47.1s. He didn't even look to be trying. O'Brien with a heat in 48s. flat and Johnny McCarthy, U.S.C., with one in 48.1s., appeared to be working far harder.

The 800 found the three joint favorites coming through as expected after crazy races. Ross Bush of Southern California, Bill Patterson of Columbia and Gene Venzke of Penn all won with home stretch drives after they had taken it easy for all but the last 100 yards. Their respective times were 1m. 56.1s., 1m. 54.8s. and 1m. 55.8s., the Lion man attaining faster figures by putting on more pressure than the other two.

HUCKER SPEEDY

The low hurdles presented Ham Hucker of Cornell as the fastest performer as he was caught in 23.7s. three-tenths of a second in back of the record, but Norman Paul of Southern California was only one-tenth of a second slower in an effortless flight over the barriers.

The real surprises of the day were few and far between. George Mackey of California led Jim Reynolds of Stanford in the shot but the Cardinal strong man is very likely to pass him on the morrow. No such opportunity confronts three of the star javelin throwers, however.

Norman Fitzgerald of California (the only Coast man to fail to come up to expectations,) Henry (Monk) Little of William and Mary, and Dick Johnson of Harvard, all failed to qualify. All had done better than 205ft. this season. The dark horses all passed them by as 196ft. was good to reach the final.
