

# PHIL COPE TIES MARK IN HURDLES

## *Carpenter Sets Meet Record*

### *Southern California Track Brigade Sweeps Two Events in Meet*

The all-conquering Trojan track team may have downed Stanford by the massive score of 86½ to 44½ before 5000 customers at the Coliseum yesterday but the irrepressible coach of the Stanfords, Dink Templeton, had enough orneriness left when the meet was over to step up with a ringing protest over the relay—so the affair can't be considered a complete success from the Trojan point of view.

And if they have to wait for the ebullient Mr. Templeton to quit kicking in order to be satisfied, the Trojans aren't ever going to be very happy.

#### HAS BLIND STAGGERS

It all arose over the fact that Estel Johnson, running the second relay lap for the Trojans, apparently became afflicted with the blind staggers while trying to keep Dellinger of Stanford from passing him and, in the course of his see-saw sprint, managed to step on the curb inside of the track.

This, in the estimation of the irascible Mr. Templeton, constituted a violation of several city, county and State statutes, the motor vehicle ordinance and the law of gravity and he sought out Referee Seth Van Patten to protest in several thousand well-chosen words.

Mr. Van Patten said "no."

#### "PREEM" PITCHES PLATTER

Despite the disparity in the total score it was a sizzling meet from the sparkling one-mile run that opened the program right down the line to the one-mile relay which found the Trojans pressed to the limit to nose out the Indians in the surprising time of 3m. 14.8s.

Outstanding features were:

Ken (Preem) Carpenter busted the Coliseum discus record when he sent the platter spinning half an inch more than 165ft. to win his favorite event.

Phil Cope, also of Southern California, tied the Coliseum and also the world's record when he won the high hurdles in 14.2s.

#### BUSY DAY FOR HAL

Hal Smallwood, Troy's big quartermiler, won his favorite event with a booming finish in 48.1s. and followed it up with a 47.7s. anchor lap in the relay.

The mile run, which opened the program, proved to be a strange event in which the Stanford boys, relying on their superior speed, held the pace back for the first two laps

and then just naturally could run too fast for little Freddy Lantz, Troy's two-miler, who was running the shorter race just for fun. Chuck Nimmo, looking like a champion, swept away from Lantz on a sizzling last lap and Warren Dixon, Stanford's second stringer, sped past the tiring Trojan runner on the stretch for second place.

## WHERE WAS BOONE?

Scarcely was the mile over before the 100-yard dash gave the fans something to argue about. Little Foy Draper, Trojan captain, nosed out Ray Dean of Stanford by the narrowest of margins and Volght



and Kneubuhl of Stanford and Talley and Boone of Southern California were so close that the judges took five minutes awarding third place to Talley. Practically everybody but the officials thought Boone was third.

Smallwood's sparkling quarter-mile victory was followed by the world's record performance of Phil Cope over the high barriers in a race which found the winner and his team-mate Staley far out in front of Stanford's Sammy Klopstock and Hunt Kingsbury. Sammy hit two of the first four hurdles and managed to bowl over a third a little later in the race and was disqualified.

## SAMMY TRAILS

Klopstock was certainly not in the best of physical condition as he tired badly in the low hurdles and finished well behind flying Lee LaFonda and Dick King of the Trojans, who made the excellent time of 23.6s.

After Edson Burrows of Stanford had raced the last lap of the two mile at sprinting speed to beat Kenny Yates for the honors in that event, Stanford uncovered a dark horse named McCurdy who pushed Ross Bush to the limit to win the half mile in 1m. 53.3s. McCurdy, an interscholastic champion of a few years ago, has been staying out of his favorite event recently and it took everything Bush had to beat him.

## TROJANS SWEEP CLEAN

The pole vault and broad jumps were clean sweeps for the Trojan army, exactly as advertised in advance, while Humbert Smith, high-jumper, and Jim Reynolds, shot-putter, captured their favorite events for Stanford. Reynolds was out around 51ft. with every put in his event, while Smith, after clearing 6ft. 4in. to beat Delos Thurber of Troy, quit jumping as his leg wasn't in the best of shape.

The relay, which furnished the climax of the afternoon, was a surprising event and it took an exceptionally good pass by the Trojans and an exceptionally bad one by Stanford to set Smallwood off in

the lead on the anchor lap. "G-Man" Dellinger of Stanford had given Malott a nice lead on the third lap and even Cassin's sizzling circuit would have set Smallwood off no better than even if the Indians hadn't become muddled in trying to pass the baton.

## FINE WORKOUT, ANYWAY

After it was all over, Stanford's Mr. Templeton tipped us off that while the meet could hardly be called a great success from the standpoint of the score it was at least a fine workout in preparation for next Saturday's struggle with California. There's one he really wants, and hopes, to win.
