

TROJANS SET TWO MARKS

440 and Mile Records Fall

*Cope and Staley in Dead
Heat; Carpter Sets
Discus Standard*

FRESNO, May 16. (Exclusive)—Eight record-wrecking young men from the University of Southern California sped through the warm night air here tonight to break two world's records and contribute the most smashing performances of the tenth annual West Coast Relays.

Before a crowd of more than 9000 enthusiastic fans, Dean Cromwell's sprint relay quartet first ruined the accepted standard for 440 yards to the accompaniment of thunderous cheers from the multitude.

Less than an hour later four quarter-milers raced around the track to win the closing event of a sparkling program and send the fans home with their teeth chattering.

CLOCKE DIN 40.7S.

The 440 yard team included Adrian Talley, Clark Crane, George Boone and Capt. Foy Draper. The group negotiated the quarter in 40.7s, thereby wrecking the world's record established in 1931 by another Trojan combination, namely, Roy Delby, Milton Maurer, Red Guyer and Frank Wykoff. These lads ran the distance in 40.8s, on this very same track.

Troy's mile relay men tonight were Estel Johnson, Jimmy Cassin, Hal Smallwood and Al Fitch. They performed the almost unbelievable feat of shaving practically a full second off the world's record set last year by Cromwell's 1935 relay runners.

NEW MARK 3M. 11.6S.

Tonight's time was 3m. 11.6s. A year ago three of the four runners who competed this evening combined with Johnny McCarthy to turn the distance in 3m. 12.4s, to hang up what was at that time a new world's record. McCarthy was missing tonight, but Hal Smallwood took his place to the satisfaction

was the more noteworthy. One thing is certain—perfect passing of the baton in both races did much to speed the Trojans to their par of records. Cronwell had drilled his men diligently for more than a month just in the art of snapping the stick and tonight his efforts bore fruit.

BEARS SHOW FIGHT

The Trojan sprinters had virtually no competition, but California made it a hard fight in the mile relay. Talley led off for the dash combination and held his own with all rivals. Crane picked up a scant yard in the next 100 and then Boone went into action. Fast traveling George gave Draper a good ten yards to his nearest foe and little Foy fairly tore up the track adding another ten during his part of the race.

EASTMAN DOES IM. 52.58

Ben Eastman and Norman Bright, great distance runners of the Olympic Club, made their initial appearance in the second event of the evening, the medley 440, 880, 1320 and one-mile relay. It was due largely to the sensational speed work of these two men that the San Francisco team nabbed first honors and negotiated the distance in 10m. 10s., missing last year's mark of 10m. 4.7s.

Upton, Eastman, O'Neill and Bright ran in that order and Ben was unofficially clocked in 1m. 52.58, for his half-mile. A fast mile by Dixon of Stanford enabled the Indians to nose out the Trojans for second place, the Redskins closing fast to beat Fred Lantz by three yards. Bright, who did his mile in 4m. 15s., had twenty yards on Dixon. Fresno State, the only other team entered, was fourth. Weiserhauser, McCurdy, Burrows and Dixon made up the Stanford team, while Lantz had Bonebrake, Jensen and Zamperini running with him.

NEGRO RUNNER WINS

Nelson, Pasadena Negro, showed amazing speed to win the junior college 100-yard dash and overshadow the sprinting of the university class competitors. Roaring out of his marks with the speed of a bullet, Nelson came tearing down the stretch and won going away with a three-yard advantage over Carter of Riverside. The time was 9.6s., equaling the time record established by Frank Wykoff in 1929 and tied two years ago by Mushy Pollock. Jordan of Santa Monica was third tonight.

Pollock was beaten in the open 100-yard dash by Ray Dean of Stanford and the class of the jaycee runners was demonstrated when he announced Dean's time as 9.8s. Leland Lafond of the Trojans took third and Hot of the Olympic Club was fourth. Most of the better sprinters, such as Foy Draper, stayed out of this race to run in their pet relay events.

JIM WINS AGAIN

Constant Jim Reynolds of Stanford won the shot put with his customary heave of 51ft. Jim added an inch and three-quarters just for good measure, but he didn't need it inasmuch as his effort was more than a foot better than that of Allee of the Olympic Club. McKay of California exceeded 40ft. for third and Silinger Dunn of the Olympic Club, heralded as the most likely winner, fell off to fourth with a shove of 48ft. 16in.

Johnny Mottram, the ex-Stanford wand-waffer, had a terrific fight tonight with the javelin from Clarence Rowland, Fresno State College star, who did 219ft. last year. Mottram did it on his last toss, sending the spear 216ft. 3/4in. Rowland was a shade over 212ft., with third to Fitzgerald of California. Tex Miller of Troy had to be content with sixth place, his toss being 192ft. 3/4in.

CLARK CLEARS 25FT.

Bob Clark, another Olympic Club star, won the broad jump and for the first time in his life the Covina athlete bettered 25ft. His distance tonight was 25ft. 3/4in. It is going to be difficult to keep Bob off the Olympic Games team this summer, although he really hopes to

make it in the Decathlon rather than the broad jump. Al Olson, formerly of Troy, was second at 23ft. 11 1/2 in. with Don Skinner of the Trojans third at 23ft. 7 1/2 in.

CARPENTER SETS RECORD

Ken Carpenter came through in the discus to reverse the decision he lost to Silinger Dunn a couple of weeks ago. The mammoth Trojan platter spinner established a new meet record of 184ft. 8in. to defeat Phil Levy of Stanford (161ft. 8 1/2 in.) and Dunn (180ft. 1/4 in.) in what was one of the best battles of the evening. Carpenter got out in front on one of his early heaves and his two rivals were unable to pass his mark.

Adrian Davis of Compton Junior College set a new national jaycee record in the afternoon, tossing the discus 191ft. 10in. and then joined the "big boys" during the evening's competition. He was good enough to take fourth place and bettered his afternoon mark by going 133ft. But the night work doesn't go in as a new jaycee record because Davis was competing unwatched.

SEFTON WINS VAULT

The pole vault flivvered out at 14ft. with Bill Sefton of Southern California the only man able to negotiate this altitude. Bill tried 14ft. 6in. for a new world's record, but brushed the bar off with his chest after clearing the height with room to spare. He was lying in the pit, looking at the jiggling bar, when it finally did another bounce and fell off.

Leroy Day and John Hocker of S.C. joined Manger of the Olympic Club in a three-way tie for second. Earle Meadows dropped out at 13ft. 9in., being bothered by an injured knee. The contention that the vaulters do not perform as well after dark as they do in the day time has repeatedly been borne out here. The lights bother the boys.

"CORNEY" WINS JUMP

Cornelius Johnson once more demonstrated his superiority over Walter Marty, world record-holder, by winning the high jump at 6ft. 7 1/2 in. The Compton Negro was unsuccessful in his attempts to scale 6ft. 9 7/8-in. for a new world mark. The answerer didn't help Corney's peace of mind any by crashing out with a flock of well-chosen words about nothing in particular every time Johnson started a jump. I wrote of this last year, but it still continues.

Troy's high hurdling twins, Phil Cope and Roy Staley, split a gold watch when they tied for first in the tall sticks to beat Tom Moore of California by a foot, with Sammy Klopstock fourth. The time of 14.4s. was equalled by Leroy Kirkpatrick of San Mateo Jaycee in winning the junior college race in a driving finish with Humphreys of Sacramento. It was too bad that Kirkpatrick, one of the nation's best hurdlers, could not compete in the same division with Cope and Staley.
