### *Williams Runs Speedy 440*

*Foy Draper, Boone Dominate  
Sprints; Skinner Leads  
in Broad Jump*

BERKELEY, May 29.—Although the University of California qualified fourteen athletes to Southern California's twelve, nothing that happened in today's preliminary trials of the Pacific Coast Conference track and field meet changed the original forecast of a smashing win by the Trojans in tomorrow's finale.

Where the Bears are in a fine position to contest Stanford for second place honors tomorrow afternoon, Southern California has so many potential first-place winners that nothing short of complete collapse can prevent Dean Cromwell's powerful aggregation from capturing the championship.

#### **COME THROUGH**

Every Trojan who went into action today qualified. Foy Draper and George Boone dominated the sprints, Ken Carpenter led the discus throwers, Don Skinner was out in front for the broad jump, Al Fitch won his heat in the 440 and every other S.C. entry moved into tomorrow's finals.

In addition to today's qualifiers the Trojans have four potential first-place men in Delos Thurber for the high jump, Ross Bush for the 880, Fred Lantz for the two-mile and Loring Day for the pole vault—plus Estel Johnson in the 400-meter hurdles, John Hooker to help Day in the vaulting act and the favored relay team.

So don't be alarmed, you hometown folks, by California's show of strength today. The Bears have a right to cheer, but the pay-off comes tomorrow night and those who hold winning tickets on the Trojans will be lined up at the window after it is all over.

#### **BITTER FIGHT**

Stanford placed eleven qualifiers today and will make a real fight of it against California, while the University of Washington showed better strength than expected by gaining ten qualifying berths.

Archie Williams, California's flashy Negro quarter-miler, provided major excitement of the trials today

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when he won the first 440 heat in the fine time of 47.5s. Williams ran easily and even seemed to slow down at the tape. The race was not run in lanes, nor will the finals tomorrow, but the first lap of the mile relay will be lamed off because there are seven teams entered.

Al Fitch, the only quarter-mile with a chance against Williams in tomorrow's trials, won the second heat today in 48.4s. Fitch did not extend himself at any time.

## DUDA SECOND

Jimmy Cassin of S.C. qualified behind Jack Weiterhauser of Stanford in the heat won by Williams, while Ed Duda of U.C.L.A. was second to Fitch.

Williams's time was a new meet record, as were half a dozen other performances, but most of the marks meant nothing because this meet hasn't been staged since 1927 and our athletes have improved tremendously since those days.

Draper had no trouble tying the meet record of 9.7s., while winning the first heat of the century, but Boone was extended to do 9.8s. in capturing the other test. The two Trojans were also winners in the pair of furlong heats.

Neither Phil Cope nor Roy Staley tried to capture his high hurdle heat. Glenn Taylor of Washington State won the first in 14.9s. and Sammy Klopstock of Stanford took the other in 14.7s. This should be a corking race tomorrow.

## MACKEY SURPRISES

George Mackey of the Bears staged a mild surprise when he led the shot-putters with a throw of 50ft. 8 1/2 in., knocking out the favorite, Jim Reynolds of Stanford, by two inches. Reynolds will probably pass Mackey tomorrow.

Mackey and Boone of the Trojans were the "iron men" of the qualifiers. The Bear weight man added a third in the javelin and fifth in the discus. Besides qualifying in both sprints, Boone exceeded 20ft. for fourth place in the broad jump.

Stanford received quite a wallop when none of her javelin throwers qualified and Allen Cranston was shut out of the 440.

Kenji Mirumoto of U.C.L.A. failed to make the grade in the broad jump, while Hurdler Anderson was shut out of the sticks.

Mushy Pollock got into the 100-yard dash finals by a whisker, tying Hay of Washington for third, and then withdrew from the furlong because of an injured knee.
