

TROJAN STARS QUALIFY IN MIDWEST TRACK TRYOUTS

*Meadows Wins Vault; Draper, Boone, Smallwood,
Cassin, Cope, Bush, Fitch, Carpenter Place*

MILWAUKEE, June 26. (AP)—Sam Allen of Oklahoma Baptist University made a strong bid for a berth on America's Olympic team by equalling the Olympic record in winning his heat of the 110-meter high hurdles in the Central Olympics semifinals tonight.

Allen leaped to the front at the start and won going away in 14.4s., the time of George Saling of the United States, in setting the Olympic mark in 1932.

MEADOWS, DAY LEAD

Trojans of the University of Southern California, national collegiate team champions, had little trouble earning places in tomorrow's finals, while two of them, Earle Meadows and Loring Day, placed one-two in the pole vault, finals of which were held tonight. Meadows won at 13ft. 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., with Day second at 13ft. 6in.

Phil Cope of U.S.C. won his heat in the high hurdles in 14.5s. Foy Draper won his 100-meter dash trial in 10.5s., while George Boone, a team-mate of Draper's at South-

ern California, placed in his heat to reach the finals.

Ralph Metcalfe, Negro sprinter, qualified for tomorrow's finals in both the 100 and 200-meter events and showed that he is approaching the form of his college days. The former Marquette University flash came within one-tenth of a second of the world record in winning the second heat of the century in 10.4s.

WILLIAMS FACES FIELD

In the first heat, Sam Stoller of the University of Michigan, also was only one-tenth under the world record. Metcalfe shares the world

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record of 10.3s. with Eddie Tolan and Percy Williams of Canada.

Archie Williams of the University of California, Robert Smallwood and James Cassin of the University of Southern California, Henry Janz of the University of Oklahoma, Harold Cagle of Oklahoma Baptist University and Robert Collier of the University of Indiana qualified for the 400-meter run. Williams made the best time—48.1s.

FITCH IN 200

Other furlong qualifiers were Herschel Neil, Marysville (Mo.) Teachers; Draper, University of Southern California; Clem Janicki, University of Wisconsin; Alfred Fitch, University of Southern California, and Robert Packard, unattached, Rockford, Ill. Best time, 21.5s. by Fitch.

Gordon Dunn, San Francisco Olympic Club, led the four qualifiers in the sixteen-pound shot put with a mark of 51ft. 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ in.

Guenn Cunningham, unattached, Lawrence, Kan., led the qualifiers in the 800-meter run, winning his heat in 1m. 54.2s.

Among other qualifiers in the event were Ross Bush, University of Southern California.

CARPENTER TRAILS DUNN

Kenneth Carpenter, University of Southern California's great discus thrower who bettered the world record of 171ft. 11 3-4in. with a heave of 173ft. in the national collegiate meet last week, had no trouble qualifying in the discus but was second in distance to Gordon Dunn of the San Francisco Olympic Club.

LASH WINS LONG RACE

Donald Lash, Indiana University's blond power house, romped past a field of seven rivals in the 10,000 meters and qualified for the Olympic finals.

The steel-muscled Hoosier junior yielded five and one-half pounds to the 91-deg. heat and a time of 33m. 45.4s. in the long grind in the two-day central Olympic track and field semifinals in the Marquette University Stadium.

LAPS FIELD

Lash, racing the 10,000 for the first time with competition, lapped everyone in the field, one man twice, before putting on a 50-yard sprint at the finish. Second place went to Floyd Lochner of the University of Oklahoma, who was clocked at 35m. 35.5s., and third place to Jack Warner of the University of Minnesota, whose time was 36m. 55.5s.

Ken Carpenter Hurls Discus to New Record

Trojan Twirls Platter 170 Feet at Marquette Meet; Metcalfe Triumphs in Sprints

MILWAUKEE, June 27. (AP)—Kenneth Carpenter of the University of Southern California and Edward Burke, Marquette University freshman, led a field of thirty-six athletes into the United States Olympic finals by bettering Olympic marks in the discus and high jump in the Central Olympic track and field semifinals here today.

Sam Allen of Oklahoma Baptist University, who equaled the Olympic 110-meter hurdles time in qualifying last night, failed to repeat in the finals and bowed to Fritz Pollard, son of the former Negro football star at Brown University.

Other laurels went to Ralph Metcalfe, Marquette University sprinter who won the 100 and 200 meters and put in his bid for a berth on his second Olympic team, and Glenn Cunningham, the veteran Kansas distance star.

STAR RALLIES

While placing fourth in the 800 meters, Cunningham won the 1500 meters in 3m. 53.2s., after coming from behind and taking the lead from Archie San Romani of Emporia (Kan.) Teachers.

Carpenter, who bettered the world record with a discus throw of 173ft. a week ago, exceeded the Olympic mark with a toss of 170ft. 2.8in. The Olympic record of 162ft. 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. was set by John Anderson in 1932. To-

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day's throw also smashed the stadium record of 164ft. 9in. Anderson set here this year.

MARK BETTERED

In taking second with 164ft. 8.9in., Gordon Dunn of the San Francisco Olympic Club also bettered Anderson's mark.

While Burke's high jump of 6ft. 6 7-16in. was seven-sixteenths of an inch better than the Olympic mark Harold Osborn made in 1924, the Negro lad failed by more than two inches of the stadium record set in the A.A.U. games here in 1934.

The two-year-old stadium record in the javelin, held by Ralston Le Gore of North Carolina, also fell when Lee Bartlett of Detroit threw the spear 221ft. 9in. Le Gore's mark was 216ft. 9 3-5in.

Metcalfe, who has equaled or bettered all standard sprinting records from forty yards to 220, was clocked in the 100 at 10.5s. and in the 200 at 21.3s., after pulling out with his characteristic burst of speed at the halfway mark.

WILLIAMS VICTOR

The 2-year-old stadium record of Ivan Fuqua of Indiana in the 400 meters was cast into the discard as Archie Williams of the University of California breezed to victory in 46.7s. Fuqua's time was 47.4s.

Featuring the first day of the two-days trials was the brilliant 10,000-meters run by Donald Lash of Indiana, competing for the first time against competition. He lapped the entire field and came home in 33m. 45.4s.

Winners of firsts and seconds in the trials here qualify automatically for the New York finals on July 11 and 12.
