

Trojans Win Track Meet

**Fresno State Crushed
in Coliseum Duel
by 107-to-24 Score**

Displaying all-around strength which bodes no good for Stanford and California, the Trojans slaughtered Fresno State, 107 to 24, in yesterday's track and field engagement before 1000 fans at the Coliseum.

Southern California scored clean sweeps in the discus, shot, javelin and 440 and bagged first and second in four other events—the mile, high hurdles, broad jump and pole vault.

Louis Zamperini, member of the 1936 American Olympic team, started the ball rolling with an easy win in the mile and although they tried valiantly all afternoon the Fresno invaders were never able to get a first place. Their best bid was in the high jump where Jack Croson tied Luther Johnson of S.C. for top honors.

SEVERAL TIE

As a matter of fact three other Trojans also tied for first at 6ft. 2in., but the winning ribbon went to Croson and Johnson because they cleared the height first. Thurber, Mallery and Carter were the trio of S.C. lads who wound up knotted for third place.

Zamperini, big gun of Troy's distance runners, put in a busy day. First he loafed through the mile, endeavoring to finish in a tie with Ned Jensen. Failing in this after jogging the entire last lap, Louis was timed in 4m. 26.6s. He can cut ten seconds off this anytime he feels so inclined.

When the 880 started it was Zamperini who paced the runners for a full lap and later he came back to run the third lap of the relay, which the Trojans won.

BEST MARKS

Best marks of the day, aside from Zamperini's mile, were registered in the high hurdles and javelin. Lanky Jim Humphrey won the tall barriers in 14.7s. against a strong wind. Chuck Soper bagged the javelin at 207ft. 4in., the best competitive effort of his career.

Hurdlers and sprinters ran into a strong wind, so Payton Jordan's times in the 100 and furlong were not sensational. He was the only double winner of the day, turning the century in
