

# Trojans Win Track Title

## Southern California Runs Off With Pacific Coast Meet

BERKELEY, May 28.—Capturing points in all but three events, the Trojans of Southern California retained their Pacific Coast Conference track-and-field championship here this afternoon before 10,000 spectators.

Dean Cromwell's well-rounded band of athletes rang up 63 3-5 points. Stanford was second with 40 7-10; California third with 36 1-10; Washington State fourth with 28; U.C.L.A. fifth with 23 and Oregon, Washington and Idaho closing with 23, 9 and 1 3-5.

Wearers of the Cardinal and Gold won the 100-yard dash, the high hurdles and javelin and tied for firsts in both high jump and pole vault. Only in the 880, mile and two-mile was S.C. unable to bag points.

### SOPER STARS

To Chuck Soper, chunky Trojan javelin thrower, went the honor of cracking one of the two meet records broken today. He tossed the wand 217ft. 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. to erase the old mark of 210ft. 8in. set last year by Bill Reitz of U.C.L.A. Reed Trusel, S.C. javelin expert, gave his team unexpected points here, when he got off a throw of 207ft., best of his career, to move into third place.

Adrian Talley, co-captain of the champions, won the 100-yard dash in 9.7s. to tie the meet mark set by Russ Sweet of Montana in 1925 and equaled two years ago by Foy Draper of S.C.

### GO EAST

Immediately after the meet the Trojans left from Oakland for the I.C.A. championships in New York next week-end, where they will be prohibitive favorites to win another title. Cromwell's boys practice in Chicago Tuesday and reach Gotham the following day.

Mack Robinson, former Pasadena Jaycee star, was high point man of the afternoon with 12 digits, garnered as result of firsts in the broad jump and low hurdles and fourth in the century. He leaped 24ft. 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., and negotiated the lows in 23.4s.

In the latter race George Anderson of California and Earl Vickery of S.C. were leading at the seventh hurdle. Vickery hit this barrier, however, and then turned his ankle and was fortunate to get fifth. Robinson fairly flew over the last three hurdles and won by two yards over Anderson with U.C.L.A.'s Berkeley a strong third.

### NEARS RECORD

Ray Malott, Stanford's doughty captain, and Edson Burrows, lanky Indian distance star, bagged more than 20 points between them and to the latter fell the honor of setting one of the new meet records. His mile victory in 4m. 17.9s. shattered the old record of 4m. 21.7s. which was set by Arnold Gillette of Montana in 1926. Ed had a cakewalk in the two-mile.

Malott came within one-tenth of a second of the meet record of 46.8s. set by Archie Williams of California two years ago and then turned around and won the 880 in 1m. 54s. flat. It was the second half-mile he has run in

the last three months. Malott also ran the final relay lap for Stanford with the Redskins taking third behind W.S.C. and California.

Doped to win both shot and discus, Woodrow Strode, giant Bruin Negro, bowed in the platter-spinning event after taking the iron bulb wafting event at 51ft. 6 1/2 in. Not only did Pete Zagar of Stanford capture the discus at 155ft. 5 1/2 in., but both Art Wrotnowski and Phil Gaspar moved in ahead of Strode. Bob Fisher of the Trojans improved his shot put of yesterday to grab fourth as all five point getters bettered 49ft.

Delos Thurber and Clark Mallery of Troy tied Law of California at 6ft. 4 in. for first in the high jump and Loring Day and Kenny Dills were deadlocked with George Varoff of Oregon for first in the pole vault at 14ft.

## BURROWS WINS

Long-legged Burrows started the day's program with a smashing victory in the mile. It was a typical Burrows race. He lay back in fifth place until the last turn and then swept by everybody to win as he pleased, with Garner of W.S.C. second, Spencer of California third, Swan of Washington fourth and little Sada fifth, ahead of Ned Jensen. The time was 4m. 17.9s., a new meet record.

Stanford also grabbed the second running event, the 440, when Malott stepped into an immediate lead and held it all the way to the tape, despite the fine challenge of Tom Berkley of the Bruins. Howard Bachman barely lost third for Troy to California's Watts. Erwin Miller did not run, being saved for the relay. Malott was timed in 46.9s.

## TALLEY WINS

Talley needed all his speed to withstand the terrific closing sprint of Lee Orr in the 100. With ten yards to go Adrian looked like an easy winner, but the apple-cheeked Cougar lad came so swiftly in the final thirty feet that the race was virtually a tie. Mickey Anderson surprised by taking third, while Jordan, who got an excellent start, went unplaced as Ledford and the highly touted Mack Robinson grabbed the remaining points.

Lee Humphrey copped the high hurdles in 14.6s. and Ivy Bledsoe surprised by adding unexpected points to Troy's total when he nipped Morgan of Washington for second in a furious finish. Bledsoe won himself a trip east for the I.C.A.A. and N.C.A.A. meets on the strength of his closing spurt.

Malott's victory in the 880 was a masterpiece of heady running. He let Modisette and Miller of California set the pace, content to jog along in fifth place until 200 yards from home. Then Ray found a hole near the rail and came up the inside with a burst of speed which carried him past everybody. Roulac of S.C. missed fifth by inches as March of Stanford nosed him out.

Orr reversed the 100-yard decision by beating Talley in the furlong. The Cougar star had a margin of two yards, while two other W.S.C. runners, Ledford and Pettichord, edged in between Talley and Mickey Anderson for third and fourth. The time was 21.2s.

Never in the lead until the final turn, but always close to the pace, Burrows used identical

ly the same tactics as he displayed in the mile to win the two-mile. He allowed Van Alstine of U.C.L.A. and Wooten of Washington State to alternate at the head of the parade and then passed 'em both with ease fifty yards from home. The time was 9m. 32.9s. Van Alstine ran a nice race to beat Wooten for second.

After viewing photo-finish movies tonight officials made two changes from the first-announced results, moving Robinson to fourth ahead of Ledford in the 100 and giving Watts third place in the 440 over Bachman.
