

TROY LOSES ONLY ONE MAN IN I.C.4-A. TRIALS

Trusel Misses in Javelin but U.S.C. Gets Thirteen Places in Eight Events

RANDALLS ISLAND STADIUM (New York) June 3. (Exclusive)—Southern California with twelve men in the qualifying trials of the sixty-second annual Intercollegiate A.A.A.A. track-and-field championships today, lost only one of them as the formidable Trojans paced the field into tomorrow's semifinals and finals, gaining thirteen places in eight events.

Generally brilliant qualifying performances were returned on the lightning-fast track on this cloudy, humid day, presaging outstanding achievements tomorrow. Cornell gained nine qualifying places, California, Yale and Pittsburgh, the defending team, champion, eight each.

TALLEY IMPRESSIVE

The foot-racing men of Troy came through their track trials in phalanx fashion, winning heats in the 100, 220, 440, high and low hurdles. Adrian Talley, U.S.C. co-captain, won both his sprint tests impressively, taking his furlong in the fastest time, 21.4s., after running a 9.0s. hundred. New York looked forward to his duels with Columbia's Ben Johnson, double defending champion, who returned 9.8s. and 21.6s., and Wilbur Greer, Michigan State, whose two heats were 9.7s. (fastest of the 100's) and 21.6s.

Talley seemed to stumble as he came out of his hole in the 100, but he gathered himself nicely and led throughout to beat Princeton's William Wilson a yard. In the 220 he came up at 150 yards and led to the end, beating Marty Glickman, Syracuse Olympian, by two yards.

MICKY CLOSE

Mickey Anderson of U.S.C. went along with his captain in both sprints. He was a yard and a half back of Greer in the 100, closing with a rush from fourth place in the last twenty to shut out Francis Zelnetz, Boston College. In the furlong Anderson ran a surprisingly close second to Johnson, holding him to two yards, but this could have been a walkover since the third entry pulled up at the halfway mark.

The quarter-mile heats were uncommonly good. Erwin Miller, another of the omnipresent Trojans in their bright crimson and gold shirts, won the second trial in 48.4s., leading throughout and coasting at the end to beat John Nevius, Cornell, two yards. Miller's heat was the slowest of four.

BACHMAN NEXT

Howard Bachman, another Trojan, ran a fine race to finish second against John Woodruff, Pitt's defending champion, in the quarter and half. The Olympic champ, an awesome sight as he moved along effortlessly on nine-foot strides, took the swift pace of Bachman for 150 yards, then swung out and breezed in ten yards to the good in 47.9s. Bachman held second safely by five yards from Bob Hamblen of Maine. Jim Herbert of N.Y.U. and Dick Gill of Boston College, two of the East's best, won the other heats in 48.1s. and 48.3s.—the best assortment of heat performances the intercollegiates have ever known in the quarter.

VICKERY FIRST

Dean Cromwell saw all three of his hurdlers prance through their first-day tests. Jim Humphrey, Pacific Coast champion, whipped down the straightaway in 14.7s. for the fastest of the four high hurdles heats, beating Dartmouth's Robin Hartman three yards. All the other heats went in 14.8s., and nothing like this has ever been seen in the classic I.C.4-A. fixture. Ivy Bledsoe, Humphrey's teammate, ran three yards back of Harvey Woodstra, the 6ft. 3in. senior from Michigan State, a junior

college transfer in his first year of intercollegiate competition.

To cap the Trojan day red-haired Earl Vickery, N.C.A.A. champion, walked off with his low hurdles in 24.1a., slowest heat, beating Cornell's Walt Zittel ten yards.

The Trojan field men did not match up to the standard work of their racing mates. Fred Trussell, who beat 200 feet last Saturday to earn the New York trip, was shut out in the javelin, throwing 140ft. 4 1/2in. for seventh place where six qualified. Chuck Soper was well below his best form with a toss of 200ft. 4 1/2in. that gave him fourth spot, eighteen feet back of Nick Valmanick, the hearty sophomore from Penn State.

Phil Gaspar and Art Wrotnowski of U.S.C. stood second and fifth in the discus, neither up to their consistent 190ft. efforts on the Coast, although they qualified handsly. Gaspar threw the plate 147ft. 6 1/2in.; less than four feet behind Harvard's John Herrick. Wrotnowski's best was only 140ft. 11 1/2in. In the shotput Bob Fisher, their teammate, qualified fifth with a heave of 40ft. 9 1/2in. as Howard Brit of N.T.C., beating fifty feet for the second time in his career, led Columbia's Frank Ryan, undefeated indoors and outdoors this year.

SMALLER POINT TOTAL

Unless the field event men improve their places tomorrow Southern California's total will be less than expected, for Soper, Gaspar, Wrotnowski and Fisher are good for only eight points as they stand tonight. Still, this is the average of two points a man, which Greenwell figured would be ample for his team.

Tom Berkley of U.C.L.A., scratching from the quartet as expected, concentrated on the low hurdles, running second by four yards to Woodstra in 21.6a., the fastest heat. Berkley eased up at the end after running Woodstra even for eight hurdles.

Arnold Nutting, qualifying in the 100, 200, and broad jump, gave California three of the Bears' nine places. Nutting won his sprint heats in 8.8a. and 21.8a., running powerfully if not in the best of form. He beat Columbia's Herb West, Ivy League champion (the judges reversed their decision of two weeks ago to give him this title today,) by two yards.

NUTTING SECOND

In the jump Nutting cleared 4ft. 4 1/2in., half a foot back of Princeton's Aaron Periss, the favorite. Guy Marcel was third in the jump at 3ft. 10 1/2in., but Rex Heap was eliminated, clearing only 3ft. Marcel came through with the best javelin throw of his career, 190ft. 2 1/2in., to qualify sixth, shutting out Trussell.

Bob Law, maintaining his Coast form, was second in the javelin at 201ft. 4 1/2in. George Anderson, missing a step between the fifth and sixth hurdles, ran a yard back of Pennsylvania's Warren Williams in a 21.6a. low hurdles heat, qualifying easily, and Charley Miller went up to the nine-man 800 final, placing second to Stanley Holt of Rhode Island in 1m. 52a. Woodruff did not, 25.6a. in his heat.
