# Bears, 81-50

## S.C. Sweeps 100 to Guarantee Victory; Zamperini Winner

California's fine track team fell before the speed and power of Southern California's super-squad at the Coliseum yesterday afternoon.

The score was 81 to 50 and after Dean Crosswell's three sprinters hogged all the points in the 100-yard dash there never was any doubt as to the outcome.

Yesterday's triumph was the 14th consecutive victory scored by the Trojans over their Berkeley rivals and if the ease with which the Cardinal and Gold athletes won is any indication of what's in store for the future it'll be a long time before the Bears get on the right side of the ledger.

### EASY FOR ZAMPERINI

Cecil Cole, California's new distance star, made a game effort to beat Troy's celebrated Louis Zamperini but he might just as well have tried to stop Hitler with a pea shooter. Louis ran away from Cole when he got ready and won the mile by more than 20 yards in 4m. 15.2s.

Later "Zamp" returned to the track and jogged the first lap behind a flock of half-milers. Two hundred yards from the finish he turned on the heat, passed everybody and hit the tape in 1m. 15.2s. for his second triumph of the afternoon. It will take a heap of running to beat Zamperini in either race this season.

### THREE NEW MARKS

Three new meet records were established. Hugo DeGroot, slated to play second fiddle to Bob Peoples, astonished himself and everybody else by throwing the javelin 227ft. 1in. This not only beat Peoples by 10 feet but also cracked the record of 213ft. 6in. set by Ken Churchill of California in 1931.

Stubby Stanley Sadaq, former Honolulu soldier who does a pretty slick job of distance running for the Bears, lopped three seconds off his old two-mile record when he toured eight laps in 9m. 25.4s. Sadaq was far too good for his own teammates and the two Trojan entries were so completely outclassed that they never even bothered to finish the race. This gave California a clean sweep with Cooper and Vollmer trailing Sadaq and matched Troy's 9 points in the 100.

### VICKERY VICTOR

Red-haired Karl Vickery sailed over the low hurdles in 23.2s. to shatter the mark of 23.4s. set by Ed Hall of Troy in 1935. Vickery will get under 23 flat before the year ends.

Troy's mile relay team won a thriller from the Bears and in doing so tied the meet mark of 3m. 16.8s. The quartet included Lytle, Grunbeck, Upton and Miller. The latter fought off a desperate challenge by California's Don Watts to hit the tape one yard to the good.

The Bears bagged but three firsts in addition to Sadaq's triumph in the two-mile. Herbert Michael won the shot at 49ft. 10in. and Bernard Wolf got off a fine heave of 152ft. 2in. to nose out Art Wrotnowski of S.C. by three inches in the discus. Capt. Guy Manuel snared the broad jump at 22ft. 8in.

### WILLIS DOUBLE WINNER

Only double victor of the day save Zamperini was Troy's Barney Willis, late of Sacramento Jaycee. He came with a rush to take the 100 in 10 flat, and California's hopes received a rude shock when Jordan and Anderson likewise finished fast to shut out Broombacher.

Willis was much the best in the furlong and stopped the watches at 21.4s. Jordan had to hurry to get second over Broombacher.

Watts allowed Upton and Mil-

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ler to get too far ahead of him in the 440 and was never able to catch the flying Trojans. Miller had too much oomph for Upton. His winning time of 48.3s. was one-tenth of a second slower than Watts recorded last week against the Bruins.

## COLE MISJUDGED PACE

After the mile it was learned that Cole had planned to run three laps as fast as he could, but that the first lap was slower than he had anticipated and this ruined his calculations. He took the lead immediately and tried to step it up but Zamperini likewise closed ground, stayed behind Cole until the next to last turn and then pulled away to win as he pleased. Cecil is a good miler but will never see the day he can lick Zamperini unless somebody cuts off one of Louis' legs.
