

Locals Nab Eight Events

**Zamperini, Vickery
Crack Marks; Woodruff
Cops Two Races**

NEW YORK, May 27. (AP)—A smooth-working, high-gear ed piece of track and field machinery swept through the 63rd championships of the Intercollegiate A.A.A.A. today and turned in a set of record-shattering performances that should stand for many years to come.

Before a crowd of 7500 in Triborough Stadium, and under perfect weather conditions, the Trojans of Southern California piled up 71½ points, highest in the meet's history, to win the team title for the second straight year and the ninth time since 1925.

Winning five individual events, sharing in two others and adding the mile relay championship as a crowning touch, the Trojans spread-eagled the field so badly that Pittsburgh, in second place, had only 26 points and none of the others got beyond 20. California was third with 16½.

But while the Pacific Coast Conference champions were making good so handsomely on their awesome reputation, Long Johnny Woodruff of Pittsburgh did all that could be expected of a lone easterner standing up against this 20-man western invasion.

WOODRUFF STARS

In his final I.C.A.A. appearance, Woodruff won the 440-yard and 880-yard title for the third straight year and made this finale the best of the three.

Forced to show fight to retain his quarter-mile honors in a four-man blanket finish which saw him equal the meet record of 47s, flat for the third time, he ran a front race in the half mile an hour and 20 minutes later and set up a new I.C.A.A. mark of 1m. 51.2s.

U.S.C.'s team score bettered its own mark of 62½ points established in 1932 at Berkeley, Cal. Woodruff's 880, in which he won by 10 yards over Curtis Giddings of New York U., who subsequently was disqualified for fouling on the turn, lopped seven-tenths of a second off Ben Eastman's seven-year-old standard.

OTHER MARKS FALL

In addition to Woodruff's performances, three new records were made and one meet record was equaled, all by U.S.C.'s representatives. Lou Zamperini, who ran the 5000 meters on the 1936 U.S. Olympic team, brought the one-mile time down to 4m. 11.2s. in his first I.C.A.A. appearance.

Red-haired Earl Vickery, who flew over the 220-yard low hurdles in 23.1s. in yesterday's eliminations for a new record, hauled that down to 22.8s. in the final.

And Bob Peoples' javelin throw of 223ft. 11½in., which led the qualifiers yesterday, stood up as the best performance of the two days. U.S.C.'s Jim Humphrey tied the record of 14.4s. in winning the 120-yard high hurdles.

ONE-TWO IN DISCUS

The Trojans also placed one-two in the discus, with Phil Gaspar and Art Wrotnowski tied for first, with Loring Day, and took third with Irving Howe in the pole vault; and put two men, Clarke Mallery and Jack Wilson, in a three-way tie for first place in the high jump.

The 440 was the most thrilling race of the day. Erwin Miller of U.S.C., coming out of second position at the start, led down the chute with Woodruff at his shoulder and Don Watts of California third. They held that order as they came into the straightaway with inches separating them and Long John almost pocketed.

Woodruff, who has to lengthen his stride when he wants to run faster, gave it all he had as they came into the last 30 yards. Literally, he fought his way up between the two westerners and literally, he won by pushing his

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chest into the tape bare inches ahead of U.S.C.'s Howard Upton, who came up like a streak on the outside.

The rest of the teams finished in the following order behind Southern California, Pittsburgh and California:

Michigan State, 15; Columbia, 14½; Cornell, 13; Brown, 12; Yale, 11½; N.Y.U., 11; Princeton, Penn State and Maine, 10 points each; Manhattan, 7; Pennsylvania and Alfred, 4 each; Fordham and Boston College, 1 each; Dartmouth and Marquette, ½ point each.

DIPLOMATIC RACE

Southern California, which yesterday had placed 15 men in 15 tries, lost potential points when Peyton Jordan ran fourth in a semifinal of the 100-yard dash. The two best winners, Barney Willis of S.C., and Bob Jackson of Princeton, were timed in 9.7, one-tenth slower than the meet record.

Wilbur Greer, defending cham-

ption from Michigan State, also missed the final as he ran fifth in Willis' heat.

If the 400 was the best race, the mile relay was the oddest. N.Y.U., on the pole, got away in the lead with Pittsburgh second. But Zamperini, hauling himself up from last place, put S.C. in second behind Pitt with New York third at the first change of batons.

Art Bowdler, racing against Pitt's Al McKee, brought S.C. into the lead on the second leg, but on the third with Upton running for the Trojans, Harold Bogrow for N.Y.U. and Clyde Graf for Pitt, there was a near-disastrous accident. Apparently Upton, cutting in to pass the baton to Miller for the anchor leg crossed Bogrow's path. They both went down, and Graf joined the pile-up.

RUNNERS HOBBLE IN

Upton bounced up first and finished, his leg in fairly good shape, but Graf and Bogrow barely were able to hobble the rest of the way. Thus the two teams that had been giving S.C. all the fight finished fourth and fifth. Woodruff's chances of running a winning anchor leg were ruined, and California and Cornell, unhampered by the start, pushed into second and third place, respectively. Under the circumstances, the time of 3m. 10.6, was remarkable.

Southern California competed in 12 of the 16 events and scored in all of them. They didn't run the two-mile, won by Pitt's Al Boulanger, or the half-mile, won by Woodruff. Nor did they enter the hammer throw, won by Bob Bennett of Maine with a heave of 178ft. 11½in., second best in meet history, or the broad jump, in which Anson Perina of Princeton retained his title with a leap of 24ft. 5½in.

Here's How Individual Trojans Scored in Winning I.C.4-A. Meet

NEW YORK, May 27. (Exclusive)—This is the way the Trojans scored in breaking the all-time I.C.4-A point total mark:

Mile run—Won by Louis Zamperini for 5 points. He also set a new record of 4m. 11.2s.

440-yard run—Howard Upton finished second and Erwin Miller third for 7 points.

120-yard high hurdles—Won by James Humphrey for 5 points. He tied the record at 14.4s.

100-yard dash—Mickey Anderson finished second for 4 points. Barney Willis was sixth.

220-yard low hurdles—Earl Vickery broke the meet record, running in 22.8s. for 5 points.

220-yard dash—Payton Jordan finished third for 3 points.

Mile relay—Troy's team, com-

posed of Zamperini, Arthur Reading, Upton and Miller, won for 5 points.

Discus throw—Phil Gaspar won and Art Wrotnowski was second for 9 points.

High jump—John Wilson and Clarke Mallery tied for first with Walter Arrington of Michigan State for 8 points.

Shot put—Bob Fisher was second and Don McNeil fifth for 5 points.

Javelin throw—Bob Peoples set a meet record of 223ft. 1¼ in. Reed Trusel was third and Hugo De Groot was sixth, out of the money, for 8 points.

Pole vault—Loring Day tied for first with Richard Ganslen of Columbia. Irving Howe was third, for 7½ points.
