

Trojan Track Team Easily Defeats S.C.A.A. Outfit

Winning every event with the exception of the two-mile and the pole vault, the Southern California track team yesterday swamped the Southern California Athletic Association at the Coliseum. The score was 94½ to 36½.

Poorly attended, what could have been a close track meet was turned into a completely one-sided contest when half a dozen of the S.C.A.A. athletes who had been counted on to provide the Trojans with trouble were unable to compete.

Earle Meadows and brilliant Don McNeill furnished the big thrills of the day when they came through with championship performances. Meadows vaulted 14ft. 8in. to win that event and McNeill shattered Bob Fisher's S.C. shot-put record of 51ft. 2¾in. when he heaved the 16-pound ball 51ft. 10in.

Micky Anderson, Trojan flash, showed strength and stride to win both the sprint races. His times of 9.8s. and 21.3s. for the

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100 and 220-yard dashes, respectively, were not sensational but do indicate he is to be considered as a possible winner in all meets in the future.

PAIR INJURED

The 100-yard event proved a heart-breaker for Coach Dean Cromwell and Trojan supporters when Barney Willis and Bobby Jones both pulled up with injured leg muscles. Willis, it is believed, can be counted out of the California meet at Berkeley next week.

Leroy Weed and Louie Zamperini did their level best to run a dead heat in the mile run but the judges decided Weed's chest stuck out further than did Zamperini's, so they gave him the race. The time, 4m. 27.1s., was slow and the race itself little more than a jog workout for the two S.C. stars.

CLOSE FINISH

Howard Upton, Southern California's best quarter-miler, had a difficult time catching S.C.A.A.'s little George Weinberg, who set the pace from the gun. Upton finally won in 49.2s.

As expected, Bob Peoples had little trouble winning the javelin and Coach Cromwell halted Johnny Wilson and Gil La Cava when they hit the 6ft. 4in. level in the high jump, the pair tying for first place.

S.C.A.A. swept the two-mile run when Cazares, Rice and Bak-

er finished in that order. The time, 9m. 34s., was the fastest the former Pasadena jaysee runner has ever made. Art Reading gave the Trojans a thrill when he stepped the half-mile in 1m. 56.8s. and served notice to all he is ready for full competition.

Both hurdle races were ragged affairs with men knocking over hurdles, falling down, stopping completely and walking off the track. Art Laret of S.C. won the lows, followed by his teammates, Kenny Dills and Norm Larson. Hommel L. Anderson and Biewener cleaned up the 120-yard high hurdle event for Southern California, the winner stepping off a 14.9s. race.
