

Trojan Track Forces Whip Stanford by 71-59 Margin

S.C. Sweeps Low Hurdles to Clinch Meet; Dills, Jeffrey, Moore, Andersen Star

Scoring 71 1/3 points to 59 2/3 for the Indians, the Trojans took Stanford into camp yesterday afternoon at the Coliseum before 20,000 screaming spectators in the greatest dual track meet ever held in Los Angeles.

Four double winners were crowned when Kenny Dills, Clyde Jeffrey, Paul Moore and Stan Andersen won two events each. The meet was not decided until the next to last event. At this time, the Trojans led with 62 1/2 points with Stanford sure of the relay and its 5 points. The wind went out of the Stanford balloon of hope when Trojan Low Hurdlers Dills, Laret and Larsen swept into the tape in that order for 9 points and the track meet.

THREE MARKS FALL

Despite the proven ability of the contestants, but three new meet records were set. Johnny Wilson, Stan Andersen and Paul Moore set new marks in the high jump, shot-put and mile, respectively. The boys were simply too keyed up, sapped their nervous systems of energy by over-anxiety, and, while running themselves into the ground, performed under their abilities in many instances.

Stanford won 9 of the 15 events.

High spot of the meet was the

double duel between Stanford's Paul Moore and Trojans' Louie Zamperini and Leroy Weed in the distance races. Moore defeated both Trojans in both the mile and two-mile races.

FAST FIRST LAP

Trojan Ed Powers paced the mile to a fast 60s. first quarter, followed closely by Moore, Weed, Mushy Girard and Zamperini in that order. He dropped out of the race and Girard stepped up to pace the half in 2m. 03s. Having done his duty he then dropped out of the race and Weed went into the lead at the three-quarter mark, which was run in 3m. 10s, after the slowest lap in the race. At this point, Weed led by a yard, followed by Moore who had four yards on Zamperini. All these men were running easily, well within themselves. Weed stepped the pace up but Moore and Zamperini hung on and, coming off the final turn, Moore went out in front with a sprint that was matched by Zamperini to carry him past Weed. The Stanford man had more steam in the final strides and held his lead by two feet at the tape.

WHAT A FINISH!

The two-mile was a duplicate of this race for excitement at the finish. With Weed setting the pace, followed by Moore and Zamperini, the latter suddenly spurred on the last turn and went into a three-yard lead. Moore opened up, caught and passed Zam in 10 strides with an unbelievable sprint. It finished Zamperini but then Weed cut loose and went after Moore. He could not quite make it and the Stan-

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ford man hit the tape two feet ahead of the flying Trojan.

It was a jockeyed finish that pulled the fans off their seats, all three men banging across the finish like 440 men. The time, 9m. 47s., was slow because the mile took much out of the runners and each of the trio was willing to depend upon his finish to win.

BUSY AS BEE

Clyde Jeffrey, as predicted, had no difficulty winning both dashes and saved enough to run anchor man on the mile relay team which defeated the S.C. quartet by 40 yards.

If any one group could be tagged responsible for the winning of the meet, it is Troy's hurdlers. They swept 18 points in these events when Stanford's Dick Simpson, running comfortably in second place behind Don Hommel, hit the seventh hurdle and dove to the track. Hommel, Art Kacewicz and Leonard Anderson took the highs and Dills, Laret and Larson grabbed the lows. It was here Stanford's Sam Hayes had been favored to take 10 points prior to his injury last week at Berkeley.

The half-mile placed the laurel

wreath firmly upon the brow of little Art Reading when he tangled with a trio of Stanfordites, Clark, Hyde and Skrabale, all of whom were capable of beating him. Coach Bill Ellington held Paul Moore out of this race to enter him in the two-mile and Coach Dean Cromwell entered Ed Powers as a pacesetter. He pulled the boys into a 55s. quarter and then turned the race over to Reading, who kept command and ran away from Clark's challenge in the stretch. The time, 1m. 55.7s., was slower than all four boys have run recently.

DILLS PEERLESS

In one of the tightest finishes of the day, Stanford's Chuck Shaw outchested Troy's ace, Howard Upton, to win the 440 and upset most of the premeet dopesters. Upton and Craig Williamson were eight yards behind the flying Shaw with 80 yards to go when the Trojan uncorked a sprint that just did miss winning the race. Seemingly it was but Shaw's forward lean at the tape that won the race for him in 47.7s.

Kenny Dills, the sole Trojan double winner, had no trouble winning his pet event, the pole

vault, clearing 14 feet on his first jump at that height. This was too tall for his teammate, Willard Schaefer, and Stanford's Bob Kenyon, who therefore tied at 13ft. 9in. Kenyon hit the bar at this height but, following a bounce, it stayed atop the uprights.

Anderson, the Indian shot-put and discus boss man, was hot in the former event and snapped the 16-pound ball 55ft. 3 3/4 in. to break Johnny Lyman's old meet record of 54ft. 9/16 in. He was too far out for Don McNeil to even threaten him. So, too, in the discus. The Indian zoomed the platter 155ft. 8in. while Stanford's Arnold Cornett managed to plop one out two feet farther than Whitney Alexander's 150 feet.

WILSON HITS CLOUDS

Johnny Wilson had things all his own way in the high jump going on to crack Delos Thurber's 6ft. 7in. record by a full inch. Gil La Cava, coming through for the first time this year when points were needed most, jumped into second place ahead of a three-way tie among Johnson, Wulff and Lincoln for third place.

The broad jump produced three men who seesawed the lead among them during the afternoon with Stanford's Ray Brown finally outjumping Mel Bleeker and Art Laret. Bleeker led with a leap of 23ft. 7in. until Brown's last jump when the latter planed out 24ft. 1 1/4 in. to take the event.
