

New Record for Harris

**Husky Indiana Athlete
Smashes Discus Mark
With 174ft. 8 3-4in. Toss**

PALO ALTO, June 20.—

Archie Harris, Indiana's great Negro weightman, spattered the world's discus record today, but his feat was achieved in the almost solitary grandeur of a training field outside the main Stanford Stadium, where trials for the National Collegiate Athletic Association meet were being held.

Witnessed by no more than a handful of spectators and a few officials, gathered for the qualifying preliminaries to tomorrow's major competition, Harris sailed the heavy disc 174ft. 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ in. to better the world's record of 174ft. 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. set by Willi Schroder of Germany at Magdeburg in 1935.

TROJANS LOOM UP

In order not to clutter up the stadium field where trials were being staged in many other events, the discus had been shunted to near-by Angell Field, the Stanford team's training area.

Besides Harris' individual feat, the team showing of Southern California's Trojans attracted principal notice today.

The program this afternoon seemed to offer strong evidence of an eighth straight team victory for Dean Cromwell's team, which earned 11 qualifying places and has some six other men due to see action tomorrow in events where heats or trials were not held today.

BEARS QUALIFY SIX

In fact, it appears that the Trojans might score more than the 62 points spotted them in pre-meet estimates.

California, with six qualifying places, Ohio State with five and Indiana with four, followed the defending champions.

Harris' great discus throw was achieved on his fourth toss and was the culmination of week after week of threats at the record on the part of the husky colored athlete. Harris had several times bettered the record in practice and had several weeks ago set an American mark of 174ft. 1in. His next best throw today was 167ft.

TERRY SHUT OUT

Today's qualifying marks in all field events will stand up for tomorrow's finals unless bettered at that time.

Probably the biggest upset of the day was the failure of Carlton Terry, Texas sprinter, to qualify for the 100-yard dash. Terry, who had been dash champion at most of the relay meets this spring, finished out of the money in the first heat. Terry had been reported slightly ill yesterday.

Next to Terry's absence the failure of Howard Upton to get a place in the 440 finals was the biggest surprise. But in the light of performances by other Trojan athletes it appears that the Southern California veteran's points might not be needed.

UPTON IS BUMPED

Running in the middle of the track, Upton was bumped just as the tightly bunched field came into view down the straightaway in the first heat of the quarter-mile. The Trojan co-captain, who was third in the N.C.A.A. finals last year, stumbled, nearly fell, but gamely kept going although he was nearly 10 yards back of the field by that time.

He almost made the grade at that, missing by only half a yard catching the fifth and last qualifying man.

MACMITCHELL TUMBLES

With Cliff Bourland being doubled in 100 and 220 instead of furlong and quarter as earlier indicated, this leaves Hubert Kerns as the only Trojan in the 440 finals. Kerns qualified easily in the heat won by Gene Littler of Nebraska, Hubie loafing in fourth spot. Littler's time was 49.4s.

Grover Klemmer taking the other trial in 48.9s.

The two hot choices in the 100, Barney Ewell of Penn State and Billy Brown of Louisiana State, scored impressive heat victories in 9.9s. and 9.8s., respectively, outdistancing their fields.

Half-mile qualifying tests resulted in victories for Campbell Kane, the double-duty Indianan, and Warren Breidenbach of Michigan, but one of the stellar entrants, Les MacMitchell of New York U., fell midway in the second heat and failed to finish in the money.

The New Yorker apparently became tangled with his own feet just after finishing the first lap. He sprawled to the track, but got up and took up what was a hopeless chase. His failure to qualify only means he'll be able to put out everything tomorrow in the mile run, where heats were not necessary today.

SMITH OUT OF 880

Warren Smith of Troy failed to get up in time to get a spot in the first 880 heat, which Kane took in 1m. 57.6s. Breidenbach's mark in the other race was 1m. 55.7s.

The meet's two top-ranking high hurdlers, Bob Wright of Ohio State and Pete Owens of Howard Payne, led the timber hoppers in their respective heats, John Biewener and Art Kacewicz of S.C. bagging thirds to qualify handily.

When it got around to 220 qualifying time, there were only nine entrants, so the heats were not much more than formalities. Ewell and Bourland were the winners. Kerns and Sinclair also placing in the first race.

The field events went just about to form, with favorites leading the qualifying tries in each case. Al Blozis of George-

town shoved the shot out 54ft. 3/4in., two feet back of his own meet record, and Carl Merritt of Troy was second at 50ft 5/4in.

PEOPLES HAMPERED

Bob Peoples, although troubled plenty with his sore throwing arm, had a couple of javelin heaves past 200 feet, his best of 212ft. 3/4in., placing him second behind Martin Biles of California, who did 215ft. 8/4in. Peoples probably will not compete tomorrow in the finals, as his mark seems almost certain to stand up for second place, all that was expected of him.

Broad jumpers were led, as expected, by Brown of Louisiana State, the lanky veteran doing 24ft. 7 1/2in. Mel Bleeker of S.C., after fouling on a great jump which appeared to be nearly 25ft., finished third in the preliminary tests at 23ft. 10 1/4in., and his teammate, Ken Wren, was sixth at 23ft. 4in., indicating extra point strength in the event for the defending champions.

SCHILLING IN ARMY

Jack Schilling of the Bruins, one of the broad-jump possibilities, was unable to get leave from his Ft. Ord Army assignment to compete here.
