LONG BEACH, March 21 .- Those high and mighty Southern California Trojan tracksters again walked off with most of the silverware and gold plate at the annual Long Beach Relays as seven records of one denomination or another fell

and another was tied.

While the official statisticians gave up attempting to score team figures early in the afternoon, Coach Dean Cromwell's thinclad army won from here to there since California, Stanford and U.C.L.A, contributed only a handful of performers and the Olympic Club failed to show up, DUELS COLLAPSE

The result was that such expected duels as Cliff Bourland and Hubie Kerns of Troy against Grover Klemmer of California in the open quarter and Hal Davis, Golden Bear speedster, against the Trojan dash men in the open century failed to materialize.

Klemmer was unable to comcle and Coach Cromwell pulled his dash men out of the hundred to save them for the relay races

### RELAY RECORD

Two record perf mances high lighted the day.
