

# Cal Scores First Win Since 1924

Unleashing all the pent-up fury accumulated in 17 straight defeats, the University of California track squad poured it on Coach Dean Cromwell's Trojans to the extent of 89½-40½ yesterday before 5000 fans at the Coliseum.

It was the Bears' first dual meet triumph over Troy since 1924, as there was no meet in 1925 and S.C.'s long streak started in 1926. It was also the locals' first dual meet defeat since Stanford turned the trick in 1933.

## Rout Bruins, Too

At the same time, Coach Al Ragan's Berkeley lads rolled over U.C.L.A., 112-19, winning every event.

The only record breaking of the afternoon, however, was done by Stanford's amazing John Fulton, who established a new American 660-yard mark of 1m. 18.9s. in defeating Harrison Packard of Pepperdine.

Fulton, an L.A. High grad, haunted Packard's footsteps until 100 yards from home, then stepped up the already blistering pace to win going away by 12 yards. The old mark was set by H. Baker at New York back in 1914.

While the Trojans were badly outclassed, they managed to turn in their customary surprises and at least went down with flags flying.

## Bourland Out

Troy Captain Cliff Bourland came up with a pulled thigh muscle and was held out of the meet altogether. Sophomore Bruce Miller filled in the 440 spot nobly by outfighting Bear Jim Dunn. He won by inches in 50.1s.

Pretty much as expected, California was bolstered by Hal Davis, Lee Angelich, Ralph Dewey, Jim Jurkovich and Stan Bernhard, who scored 49 points among them. Jurkovich nabbed the day's high point honors by winning the broad jump with a mighty leap of 23ft. 11¼ in. and placing second in the 100 and discus for 11 digits.

Davis churned off two speedy dashes over the slow track, stopping the tickers at 9.7s. for the century and 20.9s., his fastest time this year, for the 220.

## Angelich Wins

Angelich skipped over the high hurdles in 14.9s. and the lows in 24.7s. Dewey ran off with the mile in 4m. 22.2s. and dog-trotted the eight lapper in 10m. 5.2s. Bernhard spun the discus 140ft. 5¼ in. to cop the platter event and took second in the shot-put with a 47ft. 7 in. effort.

S.C. was able to round up only three first places. Ron Thomas

cut loose with a hefty heave of 48ft. 5in. on his last try to triumph; and the Miller boys, Doug and Bruce, captured the javelin and 440, respectively. They are no relation. Doug tossed the spear 184ft. 5in. and we've already told of Bruce's one-lap victory.

As for S.C.'s gallant though futile "sleeper" entrants, there were several. Bob Forbes came through along with Freshman George Kryder in the high jump to earn a first place tie with Bears Pieter deVries and Charles Ennis at 6ft. It was Forbes' first competitive effort of the season.

### Browning Tries

Then, too, Freshman John Steward held off Cal's Al Stone to grab second in the 880. Dick Browning, making one big effort to reach the heights he attained last year, ran a beautiful flight of low barriers only to weaken in the closing stages, hit the last obstacle and went sprawling five yards from the finish.

Speaking of surprises, you can't overlook Thomas' performance. Competing with a sprained middle finger, he won the shot as already related and then heaved the javelin 168ft. 5in., which was good enough for second.

It was strictly a Bearish day, however, and a great privilege for Mentor Ragan, who hurled for the Bears in the late '20's when they were always on the short end.
