

Upset Win 9th in Row for Trojans

EVANSTON (ILL.) June 12. (AP) — Southern California, voted least likely to succeed, won the National Collegiate Athletic Association's "ghost" track and field championship today—for the ninth consecutive year. There were only four Trojans competing.

Thus the Trojans, whose track prowess at long last was judged to be extinct when it came time to dope this 22nd annual collegiate affair, had something in common with the N.C.A.A. meet, which, too, was supposed to be "dead for the duration" but came back to put on a show comparable with those of peace days.

Davis Wins Twice

Southern California scored 46 points today, the lowest winning quota since Illinois squeezed out a title on 17.7 points in 1927. Last year the Trojans piled up the colossal sum of 85½ points.

California, aided by Hal Davis' double victory in the sprints—his second in two years—finished second with 39 points. Rice Institute, uncorking the meet's only other double champ in hurdler William Cummins, was third with 36 points and New York University, favored after yesterday's qualifying round, was fourth with 32.

Other high tally makers were Minnesota with 31, Nebraska with 19, Illinois with 18, Washington with 17, and Texas, Lawrence and Michigan tied with 16 apiece.

A crowd estimated at 6000 poured into Northwestern University's Dyche Stadium to witness the Trojans in their 12th N.C.A.A. win in the last 18 years. They saw no records but plenty of action.

Three Champs Win

Four defending champions were in action and three of them won again. Davis, of course, duplicated in the sprints. Clifford Bourland took the 440 again—for Southern California's only first place—and Jack De Field of Minnesota retained his vaulting crown with a leap of 14ft. 1in. However, Dallas Dupre of Ohio State finished fourth in the broad jump, which he won last year at Lincoln, Neb.

Here's the way the Trojans compiled their points in unspectacular fashion:

Bourland won the 440 and was third in the 220-yard dash. Jack Trout was second in the 100-yard dash and second in the 220 sprint. Edsel Curry racked up a second in the broad jump and Douglas Miller produced a third in the javelin throw.

Rice Has Three Firsts

Rice had the day's leading quota of first places with three, on Cummins' 14.6s. performance in the high hurdles and 23.9s. time in the low hurdles, and Billy Christopher's winning 24ft. 7¼in. broad jump.

California, of course, took two firsts, on Davis' 10s. century and 21.4s. 220 sprint. No other school took more than one first. Thirty-two institutions in all took part in the scoring.

All winning track times were

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slower than the title performances in 1942. Sheffield's high jump was one-fourth inch better than last year's peak and Christopher's broad jump was four inches greater than Dupre's best in '42. De Field just equaled his last year's vault.
