

S.C. Spikemen Choice in Coliseum Meet Today

Trojans Make Local Debut Against U.C.L.A., Conference All-Stars, Independent Team

Coach Dean Cromwell's S.C. track squad makes its bow before the local citizens at the Coliseum this afternoon and while its talent is considerably below the standard of usual Trojan squads, they should win handily over their opposition—U.C.L.A., Southern California Conference All-Stars, an independent team and a group of unattached athletes.

First event is at 2:30 o'clock.

This should be an exceptionally good day for the spectator who goes in more for the competitive interest, as the wide field—just about all the best left in the Southland—is very evenly matched virtually in every event.

Threaten Record

There will be a world record in danger, however, when S.C.'s Cliff Bourland, the defending national collegiate 440 champ, and sensational Galen Fisher of Pomona square off in a special 300-yard race. The great Charley Paddock established the record of 30.2s. back in 1921 and it's the last of the former Trojan flash's numerous marks still in the books.

While Bourland figures to edge the Sagehen flash, the latter is probably nearer to top shape and is in an ideal spot for an upset. As for getting under the record, both are capable providing the Coliseum cinders have been livened up, as is claimed. For years now the track has been "dead" and about a fifth of a second slow for a 100-yard dash.

Close Races

Just about every event on the card should be closely contested, however. S.C.'s Jack Trout should annex the sprint races while Trojan Paul Iacano is primed for a surprise victory over highly rated Harrison Packard, Pepperdine ace, in the 880. Both can hit around 1m. 56s., although Packard bettered 1m. 53s. two years ago.

The hurdles should provide plenty of thrills, with Jack Porter of Occidental slightly favored

in both. Chief opposition should come from George Kryder, S.C., in the highs and Al Izmerian, U.C.L.A., and Earl Strahl, Whittier, in the lows.

Phil Graves, who won the city high school mile crown a decade ago while attending Hollywood, makes a comeback attempt. He will have plenty of opposition from Field Berry, S.C.; Mode Perry, U.C.L.A., and Art Nash, Los Angeles City College. After graduating Graves matriculated at Georgetown and once ran the four laps in 4m. 14s.

Field event interest centers on the pole vault, in which young Dick Vanderhoof, Pomona freshman, matches leaps with Ray Maggard, U.C.L.A., and Fred Ferguson, S.C. Navy Preflight student.
