

# High Jump Tie Nets S.C. Stirring Win

By the proverbial gnat's eyebrow, S.C.'s taunting Trojans defeated a gritty bunch of Caltech tracksters, 65 2/3 to 65 1/3, in their dual meet at Paddock Field, Pasadena, yesterday.

A few Pomona College athletes also competed, and S.C. also won the triangular meet score with 73 1/8 points to 73 5/8 for Caltech and 11 for the Sagehens.

It was one of those things that figured to be decided by a point or so either way and developed into a battle for even fractions. And from the spectators' standpoint, it was a spine-tingler throughout, with surprises cropping up in virtually every event.

## High Jump Tie

There were too many spots that can be tabbed as the deciding ones but the fractions were the result of a three-way tie for second in the high jump involving Trojans Bob Carlsen and George Crum and Engineer Bob Grube at 5ft. 10in. Joe Benjamin of S.C. won the event by clearing 6ft.

The Trojans got off to a fast start when Ted Robinson, who was made eligible just before the meet, tossed the javelin 171ft. 3in. and Teammate John Ryan was second. Next, Arno Elias of S.C., running his first mile of the season, upset Caltech's George Gill in a 4m, 37.6s. mile.

That ruffled the Engineers somewhat but they fought back to place one-two in the 440 as Stuart Bates and Ken Shafer outspurred Trojan John Anderson in a stirring stretch drive. Anderson faltered in the final strides and stumbled across the finish line.

After S.C. had widened its lead again with a first and third in both the shot and high hurdles, Caltech closed up with an unexpected one, two in the 100 as Bill Frady and Roger Clapp edged out Troy's George Beaman. The time was 10s. 8in.

Elias brought in five more points by "outkicking" Shafer in the 880 but the Engineers drew up again when Frady easily won the 220 in 22.4s. and Clapp tied Bill Eagle of S.C. for second.

Caltech gained another point in the next three events as Don Tillman won the discus and Ray Wheeler, the manager of the team, was a surprise third behind Trojan Earl Audet. Bob Morris and Crum gathered in firsts for S.C. in the low hurdles and broad jump, respectively, but Caltech nabbed second and third in each case.

## Vaulters Come Through

That gave S.C. a 50 3/4-to-57 1/4 lead with only the pole vault and relay to be heard from. And S.C. needed at least six points in the bamboo event, as Caltech was a solid choice to win the relay. Engineer Roland Nielsen made the Trojan entries, Carlsen and Warren Halling, come through under pressure by clearing 12ft. But both Troy representatives were up to the occasion and tied him for first, splitting the points, 6-3.

After that, Caltech won the relay as expected and made up all the five-point gap—except for that little fraction.
