

# Troy Holds Back in 77-53 Spike Win Over Bears

Worried by ugly clouds that made the track soggy and later brought a cold wind, Coach Dean Cromwell held back several potent punches yesterday that enabled the California spike forces to make a respectable showing against S.C.'s vaunted power in their dual meet at the Coliseum yesterday, the Trojans taking a 77½-to-53½ victory.

The noontime cloudburst caused a delay of an hour in the starting time but after feverish firing of the track the athletes went to it on a still "off" strip. And but for a few exceptions, marks fitted the occasion.

## Patton Runs 9.6s.

Pell Mel Patton flashed to another impressive triumph in the 100, defeating Cal's Don Anderson by five feet in 9.6s. Patton ran a typical race, churning hard to stay with the fast-starting Anderson for the first 75 yards and then cutting loose with his skyrocket finish to hit the tape going away.

Remembering a similar day at Berkeley a year ago that caused him muscle cramps, Patton told Cromwell his fears and the wily Dean promptly scratched him from the 220. Bears Roland Maples and Anderson grabbed the break and ran one, two over Hubie Kerns, Maples winning in 21.3s.

Kerns, who had previously annexed the 440 in 49.3s., was kept out of the closing mile relay and the Bears came through with an-

other unexpected triumph. Their margin was one yard in 3m. 20.2s.

The Bears registered two genuine surprises in the high hurdles and broad jump. Ted Rademaker ran a brilliant 14.7s. race to nip Trojan Jim Gabriel over the tall timber and Jim Lilowski broke up S.C.'s slated long hop sweep with a leap of 23ft. 5in. Edsel Curry won it at 23ft. 6¼in. and Al Lawrence was a snug third with 23ft. 4in.

## Frazier Ties Mark

Rambling Ronnie Frazier ran perhaps the best race of his career when he skipped over the 220 low hurdles in 23.2s. to best Lawrence by two yards. Even over the sticky footing he equaled the meet mark set by Earl Vickery of S.C. in 1939.

Best of the other performances were turned in by Trojans Field Berry, who took the 880 by seven yards over Cal's Jim Anderson in 1m. 56.5s. and Doug Miller, who arched the javelin out 200ft. 8in.
