Bruins Set Records but Bow to Powerful Trojan Team, 81-49

Aided by a stiff breeze that would have nullified even a 9s. flat performance, Pell Mel Patton showed a liking for the 9.4s, bracket yesterday when for the second straight week he equaled the world 100-yard dash record. The sizzling sophomore thus

featured S.C.'s 811/2-to-491/2 dualmeet victory over a decidedly unawed U.C.L.A. squad at Westwood.

Patton had a 13.6 m.p.h. wind at his back while the limit for a record acceptance is 3.5. But he didn't appear to be all out. At the 50-yard mark he had only yard lead over his mediocre field. Thirty yards from the tape he put 'er into overdrive and simply glided away to win by four yards. Teammate Ron Frazier was second. Scratched From 220

Balked at any record-setting, Coach Dean Cromwell scratched Patton from the 220.

Aside from Patton's dash it was Bruin athletes who stole the limelight before the solid-packed crowd of 3000. U.C.L.A. actually split first-place honors with the mighty Trojans at seven apiece with one tie. They could snare only three seconds, however, to account for the sound thumping. Westwooders set two new

school records and did the only altering in the dual-meet marks —shot-put and 880. Jerry Ship-key bettered his own Bruin standard of 52ft. 1in. with a mighty shot-put of 53ft. 1in.,

which also far surpassed the meet mark of 51ft. 81/2 in. Biggest form reversal saw U.C.L.A.'s Frank Fletcher prance off with the 880 by five yards in 1m. 54.5s., lowering Trojan Ross Bush's record of 1m. 54.8s. After 700 yards the field of six was racked up like a set of billiard balls. Turning into the long stretch Fletcher uncorked a powerful drive and the two favorites, Bruin Ralph Gold and Troy's Wally Wilson, faded. S.C.'s Jim Slosson hung on, however, but Fletcher dug him into the cinders in the last 30 yards. His margin was five yards. The other U.C.L.A. record bet-

tered was the pole vault, in which Ray Maggard lifted his mark from 14ft. to 14ft. %in. After topping a Trojan 440 sweep with a 47.6s. clocking,

Hubie Kerns filled in for Patton in the furlong and took it by three yards in 21.5s. Roland Sink missed his own meet mark by two seconds as he reeled off a 4m. 17.2s. mile.

Two hotly contested events saw Frazier edge Teammate Al Lawrence and Bruin Craig Dixon in a 23s, flat 220 low-hurdle race and Bruin Bill Lacefield re-turned to form to annex the broad jump at 24ft. 8% in. Tro-jans Lawrence and Edsel Curry also bettered 24ft.

The Bruins lost an almost certain first when Dixon, leading the high hurdles by a yard, stumbled over the fifth barrier and sprawled.
