Seymour, L.A.A.C., Sets American Javelin Mark

LINCOLN (Neb.) July 5.-While the expected record break-ers on the track were faltering were Al Lawrence second, and under sultry 90-degree weather, unheralded Steve Seymour of the Los Angeles Athletic Club threw the javelin 248ft. 10in. for

a new American record to feature the national A.A.U. track and field meet here today. Seymour, by profession an os-

teopath, cut loose with his tremendous heave just a few minutes after Martin Biles of the San Francisco Olympic Club had tossed the spear 236ft. 5%in., which eventually was only good for second.

The former mark of 238ft. 7in. was set by Matti Jarvinen of Finland. L.A.A.C. Second

The meet was featured by a ding-dong battle for team hon-

ors between the New York Athletic Club and the Los Angeles A.C., the former finally winning out, 761/4 to 63%. Herb McKenley of Illinois and Harrison Dillard, Baldwin-Wallace flash, took their specialties, 400-meter run and hurdles, respectively, but fell short of the expected record-shattering performances. McKenley was an

easy victor in the one-lapper at 47.1s, while Dillard took the high hurdles at 14s, flat and the low barriers in 23.3s.

Relay Team Wins Besides Seymour's mighty victory, Los Angeles A.C. athletes won three other events and placed in eight of the 18 events contested today. Walt Smith and Roy Cochran of the Mercuries ran one, two in the 400-meter

hurdles. The time was 52.3s. Bob Beckus took the hop-stepjump event at 45ft. 1114in. and the 1600-meter relay team of Bill Parker, John Wachtler, Wells De-Loach and Cliff Bourland was victorious in 3m. 15s.
