Weeks of hard work paid off on the scoreboard for the Los Angeles AC yesterday as they dealt the Trojans of SC a sound thumping in their spikefest at the Coliseum before 6685 fans. The Mercurymen, showing an

amazing come-through ability, scored 85 points to Troy's 621/2. Pepperdine, third party to the proceedings, snared 14%. An unofficial dual meet tabu-

lation made the trouncing even more decisive, 85-46. Four meet marks fell during

the afternoon, two to Trojans and a pair to the LAAC aces. Patton Runs 20.7s.

Pell-Mel Patton lowered his 220-yard meet mark a 10th of a second to 20.7s. after taking the 100 at 9.7s. Patton didn't appear that fast — but that was probably because he couldn't shake off Cliff (Pappy) Bour-land. The aging ex-Trojan was within three yards of Pell-Mel in the speedy furlong and only
