

SC Flash Takes 100, 200 Meters

MEMORIAL STADIUM, MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 18 — Pell-Mel Patton really looked like the world's fastest human here today as he won both his heats in the National Collegiate A.A. trials to pace the favored Trojans.

A misty rain prevailed during the 49-degree afternoon but didn't seem to bother the forces of Dean Cromwell, who qualified six men, including Patton's double in the 100 and 200-meter dashes.

Easy Wins

Mel took his 100 in 10.6s by two full yards and then broke the tape in the 200 in 21.3s. by five yards. In both races he was in high gear only for the first half and then he relaxed.

Bon Frazier won his 400-meter hurdles heat for Troy in an easy 54s. flat, Bill Bayless is sixth among the seven qualifiers in the shot-put and Bob Chambers and Bob Pruitt looked impressive in the 500-meter run.

Gophers Strong

Only home team Minnesota looks capable of upsetting the Trojans. The Gophers have Fortune Gordien in the shot and discus, Lee Hofacre in the 400 hurdles and Loyd Lamois in the broad jump, as well as the "qualifiers" in the hammer throw who are a cinch to add one point to the Minnesota total.

Aided by anticipated pole vault points by John Montgomery, Bob Hart and John Sanders and with Roland Sink highly rated in the 1500-meter run, the Trojans look good for 50 points or thereabouts tomorrow. Minnesota might get up to 40.

Dreary Day

Ducky Drake's UCLA Bruins had a dreary day with only Craig Dixon coming through when he won his heat of high hurdles. Jerry Shipkey dropped by the wayside in both the shot and javelin. Ernie Lightner trailed in the two sprints and Fred Beck failed in the 800. Taylor Lewis was out of the discus at 144ft. 6¼in.

Clyde (Smackover) Scott broke the only record of the day when he raced the 110-meter high hurdles in 14s. flat. The old metric mark, set in 1936 by Georgia's Forest Towns, was 14.1s. The regular high hurdles meet record of 13.9s. is for 120 yards, which is a few inches shy of 110 meters.

One final was held, in the 10,000 meters, with Bob Black of Rhode Island State winning by close to a lap in 32m. 3.5s.

So tonight, the Rams are leading the meet—but not for long.

DeLoach Fifth

Wells DeLoach of the Trojans drew the roughest heat of the 400 meters and wound up only fifth. The heat was won by George Guida of Villanova over Reggie Pearman of NYU in 47.8s., the fastest of the rainy afternoon.

Joe Nebolon of Washington State, although seeded, placed only fourth and was shut out.

Mel Whitfield, the ex-Jefferson High lad who now runs for Ohio State, won his heat in 47.8s.

Stanford's Otis Chandler led the Far Western shot-putters at third place with a mark of 52ft. ¾in. Bill Bayless of the Trojans rated sixth at 51ft. 5¾in. Jerry Shipkey of UCLA was eighth and didn't make the finals. Chuck Fonville of Michigan, bothered by an aching back, managed to hold the lead at 52ft. 11¼in. Shipkey did only 50ft. 8¾in.

Donnie Anderson of California duplicated Patton's feat of winning a 100 heat in 10.6s., but failed to make the finals in the metric furlong, losing out in a photo for third.

Javelin throwers were bothered by the adverse weather con-

ditions. Frank Held of Stanford leads at 193ft. 7in. Delf Pickarts of San Bernardino Jaysee is in fifth at 182ft. 7½ in. If the weather is good they all ought to add 15 feet to their marks tomorrow.

Come Through

Troy's two 800-meter aces—Bob Chambers and Bob Pruitt—both came through o.k.

Pruitt was second behind Jack

Dianetti of Michigan State in 1m. 55s., and Chambers was just behind Tom Dickey of Louisiana State and Ohio State's Bill Clifford in 1m. 54.3s. Whitfield broke the tape for the second time of the afternoon in the other heat in 1m. 54.3s.

The dampness held back the broad jumpers and Willie Steele of San Diego, the premeet favorite, ranks only third behind Jim Holland of Northwestern and Lorenzo Wright of Michigan State. None reached 25 feet, which is usually a warmup distance for Steele. Hop-step-jump activity was delayed until tomorrow.
